God's mercy is great mercy.

There is nothing little in God; His mercy is like Himself—it is infinite. His mercy is so great that it forgives great sins to great sinners, after great lengths of time, & then gives great blessings & privileges, and eventually it raises us up to great delights in the heaven of our great God.

God's mercy is tender mercy.

He delivers it gently and with great love, carefully removing sin and guilt and shame and regret; bringing instead forgiveness and healing and wholeness of life. He is a God of wonderful mercy & he is wonderfully merciful in the way he acts towards us.

God's mercy is undeserved mercy.

As all true mercy must be. There is already a name for deserved mercy – it's called justice! There was no right on our part to receive the kind consideration of the Most High. We could not earn it, we deserve to be under God's judgement forever. Only God's sovereign love, displayed in Jesus, is able to grant us mercy and deliver us from that fate.

God's mercy is effective mercy.

Some things are beautiful but make no difference. God's mercy works.

It redeems, it releases, it restores, it revives, it resurrects.

His mercy is a transforming medicine to your drooping spirit; a healing ointment to your painful wounds; a heavenly glue to your broken pieces; a royal chariot for your weary bones; and an overwhelming love to your trembling heart.

God's mercy is multiple mercy.

You may think you have received just one mercy, but you will discover that it is a whole cluster of mercies. His mercies are new every morning and we need them every day.

God's mercy is abounding mercy.

Millions have received it, yet it is never close to running out.

It is as fresh, as full, and as free as ever.

God's mercy is unfailing mercy.

It will never leave us. It will be with us in temptation to keep us from yielding.

It will be with us in trouble to prevent us from sinking.

It will be with us as we live to be our light and salvation.

And with us as we die to be the joy of our soul for all eternity.

God's mercy is costly mercy.

Mercy requires paying the cost of justice, and for us, that is the cost of Jesus' life.

None of our sin has ever been swept under the carpet. It has all been paid for.

Jesus paid with his life, so we could receive his mercy for free.
