



A Celebration of Life Leonardo "Leo" P. Mendoza

Leo was born the 7th child of 8 to Rosario Puga and Ramon Mendoza in Corona, California on August 30, 1943. He grew up in Alberhill with his siblings Lupe (Romero), Bobby, Alice (Salgado), Raymond, Richard, Mary (Martinez), and Nicholas. During his youth, he enjoyed spending time with family, playing baseball, and walking the trails in the hills near his town with his dog. At age 18, Leo enlisted in the Air Force which brought him to Salina, KS.

At the end of his service, he met and fell in love with Karen Walline. This prompted a sudden move to McPherson. The two married on October 14, 1967. They were blessed with three children, Kina, Nikki, and Richard. Leo's passion for baseball continued as he tossed the ball around with his children and played the role of #1 fan at their softball and baseball games.

After the nest emptied, Leo and Karen went on many trips to visit almost every Major League baseball stadium in the U.S. and Canada. If he wasn't at a game, you could be sure to find him on the couch watching baseball, usually with a dog, if one was available.
