

In the later years, mom was always interested to hear how the great grandchildren were doing. Some special memories of multi-generational pictures fill her family's phones and her photo albums. She loved seeing their pictures and hearing about their activities and accomplishments.

Mom's hospitality was legendary. She baked pails of scuffles, cookies and squares for her children and grandchildren. She would get after those who didn't return her containers in a timely manner. Hosting Thanksgiving or Christmas gatherings as long as she could, she encouraged the family to continue this tradition as the family grew.
