

This year, the Karadinga Sports and Recreation Centre in South Australia hosted a successful junior tournament with a twist at the completion of the event. Held on the 26th of August, participants in the event were given the great opportunity to play on the recently finished UV Court. UV Squash involves the painting of lines of the court and the ball in UV paint. When illuminated by a black light, it creates a new and exciting playing experience for Squash players – old and new. Karadinga's UV Edge provides an exciting and different approach to the sport though it wasn't an easy accomplishment by any means. Karadinga reports that it had been a long road to getting the event to a playable standard, with some doubt in the Squash community that this was not possible due to previous failed attempts. Over 200 hours was required to develop UV Edge, with detailed planning required to ensure that the lighting and environment was optimal for play. Success for Australian Squash at GC2018

27 referees from 11 Commonwealth nations, competed in some 140 Singles matches and 115 Doubles matches – the busiest and most successful athlete being Kiwi star Joelle King who compressed 15 matches into the period en-route to collecting two gold and one bronze medal.

Australian veterans David Palmer and Rachael Grinham, both aged 41 and former world number ones, both added to their medal tallies. Palmer extended his tally over six Games to nine medals, more than any other squash athlete. Queenslander Grinham became the most decorated female athlete after a Women's Doubles bronze took her total to eight medals, thereby maintaining her record as a medalist in each Games in which she has competed.

In the longest and, arguably, most popular wi on day one, Aussie Rex Hedrick upset the form book by overcoming Malaysia's 13th seed Eain Yow Ng in five dramatic games. At 2/1 down, the unseeded 29-year-old came back to draw level, then saved two matchballs in the decider to beat in 93 minutes. Day 1 also saw upsets by Jamaican pair Lewis Walters and Chris Binnie who defeated Peter Creed of Wales and 3rd seed of India Saurav Ghosal respectively.

The women's quarter-finals was contested by the top eight seeds, all won their round of 16 matches comfortably except, Australia's Donna Urquhart who overcame compatriot and reigning Australian champion Christine Nunn in a five game tussle.

Cuskelly was forced to withdraw from his match against Malaysian Nafiizwan Adnan to put the Malaysian through to the last eight, where he'll face top seed and defending champion Nick Matthew. The other Men's Quarterfinalists included Cameron Pilley, James Willstrop, Alan, Clyne, Joel Makin, Darryl Selby and Paul Coll

The first player through to the semi-finals was England's Sarah-Jane Perry, who disappointed the home crowd as she beat Australia's Donna Urquhart in four games. Wales' Tesni Evans had beaten Laura Massarc in their last two meetings, and she made it a hat-trick as she downed the top seed in a tense four games.

The first two men's matches went the full distance, first James Willstrop ended Australian hopes as he twice fought back from a game down, finally maintaining his unbeaten record against Cameron Pilley, finishing the stronger in a 94-minute marathon. Top seed and two-time defending champion Nick Matthew fell to Malaysia's Nafiizwan Adnan in another five game marathon.

an absolute thriller as two-time defending champion Nicol David produced a spectacula escape to deny Alison Waters. The fifth-seeded Englishwoman took a two game lead but the Malaysian icon fought back to set up a decider. Waters led 10-8, but David took the next four points to keep her hopes of a third Gold in a row alive. The third men's match was another marathon five-setter as Wales' Joel Makin came from one-two down to beat Scotland's Alan Clyne in a hour and a half of determined squash.

The final matches of the day saw New Zealand second seeds Joelle King and Paul Coll. King beat Joshna Chinappa in straight games, and Coll came through a tough four game encounter to beat Daryl Selby, finishing after midnight.

Semi-final day saw Sarah-Jane Perry as the first player through to the finals with a straight-game win over Tesni Evans, maintaining her impressive head-to-head record against Wales' British Champion. More English success followed as James Willstrop reached a third Commonwealth Games final in a row as he beat Nafiizwan Adnan in straight games.

New Zealand's Joelle King stopped Nicol David's hopes of a third Singles Gold medal in a row as she beat the Malaysian in four fast paced games. Paul Coll made it a Kiwi double as he came from two games down to beat Wales' Joel Makin in another marathon affair.

New Zealand's Joelle King became the Women's Champion after coming through a thrilling five-setter against England's Sarah-Jane Perry. Second seeded King took a two game lead. Perry fought back though, took the third comfortably and saved a match ball in the fourth before levelling the match. King went 5-0 up in the decider, and although Perry fought back to level at 8-all, it was the Kiwi who took the next three points and the Gold Medal.

James Willstrop, appearing in his third consecutive Commonwealth Games Final at last claimed GOLD as he beat Paul Coll in straight games. The 18-minute first game was close all the way with Willstrop edging ahead from 9-all to take the lead. The tall Englishman was in charge for the next two games.

After the conclusion of the Singles, it's on to the Doubles with the first of three days of Pool matches. Day 1 of the doubles saw 16 morning, 14 evening matches and one walkover – with the seeded players victorious in all but one case. World Champions Joelle King & Amanda Landers Murphy lost out 11-10, 11-10 to young Malaysian pairing Rachel Arnold and Sivasangari Subramaniam.

Day Two kicked off with top seeds King & Landers-Murphy needing to beat Aussies Nunn & Cardwell to avoid an early exit. They duly did so, and when Malaysians Lee & Sivasangari beat the Aussies too, to advance to the quarter-finals.

All the top 8 seeds in the three doubles event won through the pool stages and th first round of the knockout stage to reach the quarter-finals.











Top seeds and World Champions Joelle King & Paul Coll scored the narrowest of wins as they edged past India's Joshna Chinappa & Harinder pal Sandhu in two sudden-death games. They'll face more Indian opposition after Dipika Pallikal Karthik & Saurav Ghosal upset third seeded Welsh pair Tesni Evans and Peter Creed, saving a couple of game balls in the second before taking it in sudden death.

In an all-Aussie meeting on the Glass Court, with fourth seeds Cameron Pilley & Donna Urquhart prevailed in two games over Ryan Cuskelly and Rachael Grinham. In the semis they'll face second seeds Alison Waters & Daryl Selby, who had to save a couple of match balls before beating fellow English pair Jenny Duncalf & Adrian Waller in a suddendeath decider.

England were assured a finalist as they claimed victory in the first two Men's quarters James Willstrop & Declan James came from a game down to beat India's Malhotra & Tandon, while Daryl Selby & Adrian Waller produced a big upset on the side courts as they too came from a game down to beat to seeds and world champions Cuskelly & Pilley in third game sudden death.

In the bottom half of the draw second seeded Scots Greg Lobban & Alan Clyne came from a game down to beat young Malaysian pair Ng & Kamal, while Zac Alexander & David Palmer kept Aussie hopes alive as they beat third seeded Kiwis Coll & Grayson in three games

After losing their first Pool Match top seeds Joelle King & Amanda Landers-Murphy found themselves into the quarter-final against second seeds Jenny Duncalf & Alison Waters. It was the Kiwis who came through, taking the first in sudden death before easing through the second.

Home interest was maintained as Aussie pairing Rachael Grinham and Donna Urquhart staged a remarkable comeback to deny Wales' Tesni Evans & Deon Saffery. After taking the first game the Welsh went 9-1 up in the second but the Aussies fought back to lead 10-9, saved match ball as they won the sudden death point and went on to take the third comfortably.

Both Mixed Doubles semi-finals were thrilling affairs and both produced upset results. After dropping a close first game to top seeds King & Coll, India's Dipika Pallikal Karthik & Saurav Ghosal fought back to level, then moved into the final as they carried a slender lead through the decider, clinching the win in sudden-death. Australia's Donna Urquhart & Cameron Pilley also lost the first game, to second seeded English pair Waters & Selby, but fought back to take the next two games to the delight of the packed crowd at Oxenford Studios.

The Men's Semi-finals opened with an all-English clash, and it was Daryl Selby & Adrian Waller who prevailed over compatriots James Willstrop & Declan James as they came from 7-9 down to take the first game, then in the decider saved two match balls before finally taking the win on a 'no let' to the opposition in sudden-death after 87 minutes.

David Palmer and Zac Alexander delighted the packed Aussie crowd as they edged a close first game against second seeded Scots Alan Clyne & Greg Lobban, then played brilliantly from 0-3 down in the second, claiming their place in the final in just over 30 minutes.



The women's semis followed similar patterns as the higher-seeded pairs took close first games then powered through the second. Defending champions Joshna Chinappa & Dipika Pallikal Karthik showed all their skills against England's Massaro & Perry, World Champion Kiwis Joelle King & Amanda Landers Murphy continue to put their early loss behind them as they beat Aussie rivals Grinham & Urquhart.

England and Australia shared the two events' bronze medals. The first match, saw fourth seeds Rachael Grinham & Donna Urquhart beat the English pair Laura Massaro & Sarah-Jane Perry 11-6, 11-8. Later, England's No.4 seeds Declan James & James Willstrop needed 58 minutes to get the better of Scottish rivals Alan Clyne & Greg Lobban, the second seeds 11, 9, 11, 9

The Mixed Doubles Bronze medal match featured the top two seeds. Kiwis Joelle King & Paul Coll defeated England's Waters & Selby, to take the Bronze 11-6, 11-6. King, the world No.4, partnered Amanda Landers-Murphy to an 11-9, 11-8 win in the Women's final over Joshna Chinappa & Dipika Pallikal Karthik, the Indian pair who won gold in the 2014 Games in Glasgow

Australia picked up its first Gold medal as Cameron Pilley & Donna Urquhart came from behind in both games to deny Dipika Pallikal Karthik and Saurav Ghosal and win 2-0. It was fitting that the final match on the final day of 11 days of intense Commonwealth Games Squash competition at Oxenford Studios in Gold Coast produced a second gold medal for hosts Australia, when Zac Alexander & David Palmer held off English rivals Daryl Selby & Adrian Waller in a thrilling near-hour-long Men's Doubles

ret was almost certainly the farewell Games performance of veteran campaigner Palmer, the 41-year-old former world number one from New South Wales who has featured in the sport's six appearances in the Commonwealth Games since 1998, and has now extended his record medals haul to nine.

Squash Foundation – Paris 2024

The World Squash Federation (WSF) has partnered with the Professional Squash Association (PSA) to ramp-up efforts for Squash to be included on the Summer Olympic Games program with an immediate target on Paris

Leading players have also made it clear their desperation to join the Olympic programme with James Willstrop and Nicol David, the eight-time women's world champion, repeatedly saying that she would swap all her world titles for a gold medal.

By the criteria that the International Olympic Council (IOC) uses to measure prospective sports, squash has a strong case. The sport has genuine global appeal: last year 47 countries hosted tour events, featuring players from 74 nations.

New rules allow hosts to propose additional sports which bodies well for squash in Paris. As discussed at the World Squash Federation (WSF) President's Council there has been a request for funds. Minimum \$15,000 a year for two years from member nations to support the Paris 2024 bid.

All states have graciously agreed to donate \$1 per player each year, for two years to contribute the fundraising efforts, with Squash Australia filling at least to the minimum level each year if not more.

The Case for Paris 2024

The World Squash Federation (WSF) President - Jacques Fontain is French and currently sits on the French National Olympic Committee. As a nation they have several strong medal contenders such as Gregory Gaultier, Camille Serme, Thierry Lincou, Mathieu Castagnet, Giegoire Marche and Lucas Serme.

The sport would enjoy significant benefits if it were added to the Olympics. It would entitle Squash to funding from the International Olympic Council (IOC) making a substantial difference to development work.

Seeing the event in the Games would help to grow squash's fan base, and the prospect of winning an Olympic medal would also give young players another incentive to pursue a career in the sport.

Logistically, squash would be an easy fit for the games. The format that has been proposed is singles tournaments for men and women, featuring 32 players apiece which could be run exclusively on two all-glass courts, either inside or outside.

Squash has already shown its suitability in other multi-sport events including the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games, where more than one million people watched the men's singles finals.



World Squash Federation - Key Appointments

Weber Shandwick has been appointed by the World Squash Federation (WSF) as a communications campaign partner to provide strategic counsel and global public relations in its bid for squash to be contested at the Paris Games.

The decision follows the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between the two bodies with the intention of developing Squash on a global scale.

Olympic ambition is the cornerstone of the World Squash Federation's unified structure, which was created to expand squash's international profile as a sport and grow it at all levels.





The long fight to have squash included in the Olympic Games has taken a positive step later this year when it is included as a showcase sport at the Youth Olympic in Argentina.

There will be no medals up for grabs, but six days of exhibition games which will provide a chance to show off the dexterity, strength and athleticism required to be a top-level squash player.

"This is going to be a great opportunity for our sport, and a wonderful chance for two of our young players to experience an amazing event," Squash Australia CEO, Richard Vaughan, said.

"There will be 18 male and 18 female young ambassadors, being part of an event that could well be a step towards our dream of being part of the Olympic program.

"Everyone involved with squash has worked incredibly hard to convince the Olympic movement that we belong in their Games, so we are very grateful to the organisers of YOG 2018 to be given this opportunity."

The YOG began in Singapore in 2010, an event designed to give the world's best young athletes a chance to experience competing at a major multi-sport event.

It's also an opportunity to showcase and trial new sports. It will be the first time squash has been part of an Olympic event. "As a showcase sport, there will be no medals, no scoring, no podiums," Vaughan said.

"But there will be a showcourt, introductory clinics, even an inflatable court. We will make sure squash puts on a show to remember."

The format will see three pools of six players each in both male and female competition. Only one male and one female from each country will be permitted to attend.

The athletes will also get to attend the Buenos Aires opening ceremony, as well as attend all the other sports.

The 2018 Youth Olympic Games will be held in Buenos Aires, Argentina, with the squash competition running from October 7-12.

The two selected athletes who have be chosen as ambassadors to represent Australia at the 2018 Youth Olympics is Alex Haydon and Ethan Eyles!

CEO Report

For the end of the 2017/2018 Financial year it gives me great pleasure to write this report highlighting the organizations achievements and successes over the period, and to express to the numerous individuals and organizations that have contributed to the growth and development of Squash in Australia over the year.

There have been many highlights over the period of this report, but I have picked out a few outstanding achievements:

- Three medals at the 2018 Commonwealth Games;
- The opening of the Carrara Squash Centre with legacy assets on the Gold Coast;
- Saving and turning around the Southport Squash Centre;
- Growth in Aust Play survey numbers to the highest number in several years – 185,000;
- A new National Clothing contract with BLK;
- Further strengthening of the Squash Australia brand;

Squash Australia (SQA) and the State and Territory Associations (STA) continue to work collaboratively across a range of areas and programmes to better align and reduce the duplication of services.

This will continue to be a focus area for the respective Boards, Presidents' Council and the Executive Council.

2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games

The 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games was a great spectacle for our Sport.

There was success on the court with two gold medals and a bronze. This despite an injury to the Australian Number one male player Ryan Cuskelly, which ruled him out of medal contention in three disciplines.

The event itself looked great and was well supported in terms of ticket sales. Both elements are important for securing the sport's continued place in the Commonwealth Games and future Olympic Games inclusion.

Finally, the volunteers throughout all elements of the event did a fantastic job with great support from the entire squash community, officiating, helping with presentation layout, ticketing, transport and in many other key areas.

A special "well done" to all those involved and especially Kay Kendall, the Squash Australia Events and Membership General Manager, who played a key role as the GOLDOC Squash Manager in the two years leading up to the event.

Squash in Australia Strategic Plan 2016 – 2022

In collaboration with the STAs ["State Associations"], SQA has continued to focus and invest in the delivery of strategic initiatives outlined in the Squash Australia Strategic Plan 2016 – 2022.

Significant progress has been made during the past two years, but we are fully aware of the considerable amount of work that still must be completed.

With this, there are many changes in society influencing how people consume sport and spend their leisure time. So all Squash organisations in Australia should remain flexible and innovative with their planning to adapt to these future changes and trends.

This has been reinforced by the new Strategic direction of SportAUS and their focus on base health activity and physical literacy, a challenge we will need to adapt to and support.

Several Working Groups and Panels involving SQA, STA's and external individuals have played important roles in progressing and delivering many strategic initiatives outlined in the Plan, and while recognized later in this Annual Report, we thank those persons for their contribution.

Through this Strategic Plan I am happy to say we have been fully rated green by the Australian Sports Commission across all areas, with an overall score of 93%, up from 85% the previous year and 61% back in 2015. This status has been attained by the

operational team meeting targets. We have actually increased both full and exposure participation, governance has improved yet again and the financials are on a good footing with excellent reporting back to the Commission which they appreciate. It is important we keep up with any reforms in this area, so that we can retain and increase funding for the sport.

At the end of the 2017/2018 period the sport can look back with a sense of pride in what has been achieved over the past 12 months, and with hope looking forward, with the sport included for the first time in the 2018 Youth Olympic Games, which positions it in a great place for inclusion in the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

Participation

Participation rates in Squash increased by 12,000 from 2017 to 2018 to 185,000. Social Squash is the most popular format of the sport and it has been very difficult to capture these numbers accurately. We have 18,000 playing in pennant or more formal competitions and 25,000 participating in the Oz Squash/School Programmes.

New members of the SQA Participation team who joined during the period, include Hamish Cain, Stephanie Yoon and the four State based Community Engagement Coordinators (Amanda Rankin, Meredith Hodson, Leanne Davey and Lucas Norman).







A major focus of their work has been in the development of National participation programmes with Hits and Giggles, Pop Up Squash and Oz Squash being completed; and work under way on Play, Learn, Move, Cardio Squash and Social Squash.

In addition, the roll-out of the Sporty HQ Matrix software has been a major focus, especially for the State based Community Engagement Coordinators and we have successfully engaged six of the eight State/Territories.

High Performance

I have already touched on the great performance of the Australian Commonwealth Games team at the Gold Coast Commonwealth Games. Another highlight however was the three medals at the 2017 World Championships in Manchester. Cameron Pilley and Rex Cuskelly the climax winning the Gold medal in the men's doubles, with bronze medals for Donna Urquhart and Cameron Pilley in the mixed doubles and Rachael Grinham and Donna Urquhart in the ladies' doubles.

Events

The annual events programme commenced with the hosting of the Australian Junior Championships in Geelong, Victoria. This was shortly followed by the Australian Open in Darwin, the Graded National Championships and Australian Doubles. These were the first Australian Doubles and Graded championships for many years.

In January we hosted the Oceania Championships in North Brisbane, followed by the Australian Junior Open on the Gold Coast.

In February we hosted the Australian National Championships, Australian Doubles and Squash Australia Annual Awards in Melbourne where once again, we paid tribute to just some of the great work taking place by volunteers across Australia and congratulations again to the 2017 nominees and winners.

Commercial Development

We thank our continuing partners being Victor, Ashaway, Dunlop, Schweppes, Peters and Red Bull; and we welcome new partnerships with Teutron Trainers and BLK clothing.

SQA and the STAs continued to work closely in partnership with the Squash Australia technology platform provided by Sporty HQ to roll out and improve the events and participant payments platform. A priority for the past year has been the rollout of the new Matrix system which has largely been delivered to schedule.

The most significant item in the commercial space in 2017/2018 has been in the facility space which has seen:

The take over and successful turnaround of the Southport Squash Centre which was due to be closed in December 2017;

The launch of the new Carrara Squash Centre on the Gold Courts with Commonwealth Games legacy courts which was opened in Jun 2018.

Leadership and Governance

In partnership with the SportAUS, SQA has maintained its 100% compliance of the SportAUS Mandatory Governance Principles.

We note continued feedback for a State Governance Code and we have provided incentivized cash funding for improvements in State Governance via the State Investment Agreements.


The SA Audit, Finance and Risk Committee was very active improving the processes and systems in place through 2017/2018 led by AFRC Chair Richard Majlinder.

Communications

In such a model each STA can retain its own individuality and personal identity through unique elements specific to their region. Brand uniformity in the sport will assist in overall recognition of the greater squash brand, assist in the commercialization of the sport, and allow every association to use their logo on apparel and new media.

President Report

This report is for the year ended June 2018. While I write the report, I do so on behalf of the Board, a group of dedicated volunteers for our sport. I am writing about Sam Chadwick, Dave Whan, Michael Jaroszewicz, Michelle Martin, Dale Robbins, Joanne Brodie, Chris Sinclair and myself.

Given the relative stability after a number of years of significant change, and the growing experience of the team, it is no surprise that this was a year with some significant items to celebrate. I take this opportunity to thank Sam Chadwick for two years of service, and Dave Whan, for one and a half who left the Board this year.

I also need to recognise the contribution of Richard Majlinder as Chair of the Audit, Finance & Risk Committee, and Margot Foster as the Chair of the HR & Nominations Committee, and all the members of the Working Groups, many of whom bring their skills from outside our sport.

Strategic Plan

Squash in Australia 2016-20122. For many organisations, a strategic plan is an administrative exercise. Something that needs to be prepared every few years, and then kept in a file to show to people when they ask. With Squash Australia, two years after being agreed to by the Board, staff and its all its members, Squash in Australia 2016-2018 is a living breathing document, that directs every major decision of Squash Australia. From having a person in the office responsible for delivering each of the nine Key Result Areas, to having a Working Group established to support each of them. One of the necessary requirements for success, is to have clearly identified measurable milestones, and to monitor progress against them. I recognise the success of each person involved in achieving this best practice of aligning activity with the Strategic Plan and applaud them for the milestones they have recorded as being achieved to date.

The nine Key Results Areas ["KRAs"] are Participation, Membership, Events, Facilities, High-Performance, Education, Influence, Profile and Leadership Excellence. In some of these areas we are targeting achievement today, and in others we are laying down the foundations for tomorrow. Let me briefly touch on each one.

Participation

While all the KRA's are of equal significance, this one is the 'canary in the mine". This one is the easiest to measure and is the outcome of all the rest. It shows that there are now over 180,000 people playing squash in Australia at the end of calendar 2017. The reason that is HUGE, is that after thirty years of reducing participation in our sport, from an estimated high of 500,000+ players to a low of 104,000, we have now had three sets of increasing numbers. It is becoming "cool" again to not only play but tell others you play squash. That is a strengthening of the financial viability of the clubs and centres, as well as the state associations and ultimately the sport nationally.

Membership

The implementation of SportyHQ will provide the infrastructure with which the clubs and centres, and then the States will be able to drive membership utilising today's modern communication technologies.

Events

Events showcase the sport for the general public and all the sport's participants. The Commonwealth Games identified both our current strengths and weaknesses in this area. The strength was the quality of the visual presentation of the sport on television. The weakness was the perceived and actual small audience size. SqA are in the process of building the capacity to run great events and increasing the size and scope of events for different strategic purposes. Introducing the Australian Doubles Championships, to increase the skills base in our area of global excellence; reintroducing the Graded nationals and the Teams nationals to support increased participation; and running a WSF event each year, to increase our International and domestic profile.



Facilities

After having lost two thirds of all the Squash Centres that were in Australia thirty years ago, we now need to start replacing them, to provide somewhere for our new players to play. We understand that they will be built almost exclusively by Local Government as part of multi-sport centres. We are in the process of finalising the presentation packs for Local Government of the engineering and business case solutions, which will facilitate these future decisions. In the meantime, we must rejoice the creation of the first national Squash Centre in Australia, owned and run by Squash Australia. Carrara opened its doors in June of this year, with six of the Goldoc courts permanently set up, and the Glass

High-performnace

As is stated in much detail elsewhere in this report, our teams did exceptionally well this year, with three medals at the World Doubles Championships and three at the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast. All the members of both teams, and their support staff are to be congratulated on their contribution to the teams' excellent results.





Education

The sport needs coaches, referees and administrators in sufficient numbers and with the requisite skills to support the desired growth. On-line training programmes have been developed as the start, and further courses are in the process of being created to meet this need.

Influence

We have commenced building networks and good relationships with some of our key stakeholders being AUSPORT, the CGA and the WSF. We have a long way to go as a sport to widen this to the national footprint that other sports in Australia have achieved.

Profile

While we have built the basic infrastructure, to create and measure our profile, we have a long way to go. And like all second level sports, will struggle for space in the mainstream media, as the seven high income sports grow their revenue and media footprint.

Leadership excellence

Without excellent leadership, it is a truism that no organisation can survive, let alone prosper and grow. Squash Australia had commenced organising leadership training courses for the paid staff nationally and is commencing a Governance improvement programme for itself and making it available to all the States.

I applaud Richard Vaughan our CEO and his staff for their efforts over the last twelve months. They have been hectic, but they have achieved significant progress for our sport, with limited resources. More so when many were seconded to Goldoc for the games. It could not have been achieved without the active participation of many State Boards and their executive officers, whose efforts are acknowledged. Let me also add my thanks to the hundreds of volunteers who week in, week out, work to deliver our sport to the almost 200,000 players around the country. A hearty "thank you" to each and every one of you, for this great year.



High Performance Working Group Report

2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games

- The Australian Team had a successful campaign at the 2018 Commonwealth Games held on the Gold Coast. The team checked into the well-designed Games Village a week early for a holding camp to prepare for their respective events. A tough singles campaign seen some amazing performances by our players but unfortunately fell short of their medal rounds. The team accumulated 2 Gold Medals and one Bronze with Donna Urguhart and Cameron Pilley taking out the Mixed doubles and David Palmer and Zac Alexander the Men's Doubles. Donna claimed a bronze medal in the Women's doubles event with partner Rachael Grinham. Focus now shifts to the 2022 Commonwealth Games to be held in Birmingham.

Daily Training Environment - Early July the high-performance group moved all training into the brand new Legacy venue from the Comm Games at Carrara. The new 6 court facility is a welcomed addition to the Community and the high performance program. We have further developed the HP team adding Former Tennis Australia S&C Coach Alex Hynes to spear head the players individual S&C programs and a partnership with the Gold Coast Suns allows us to utilise their state of the art high performance Gym and Recovery facilities. Participation Working Group Report

The Participation Working Group (PaWG), led by Squash Australia President David Mandel, has continued to see growth of recorded participation rates in Squash across the country. With the success of Squash at the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games and the continued growth of participation programs, Squash Australia continues to work towards the sport becoming a thriving participant sport for all Australians.

The introduction of four Community Engagement Coordinators across the country has had marked influence on the development of Squash participation.



Through the CECs, important relationships for the continued growth of the sport have been forged with: clubs and centres, the State and Territory Associations and with other key stakeholders such as schools and universities

The focus in the Participation area over the past year has centred around the development and the implementation of two new programs. Play Move Learn, a multi-skill program designed for children aged 3 to 7 years of age, has seen great success in South Australia and on the Gold Coast. These pilot programs provided useful information as case studies to provide further guidance for development. Cardio Squash has also seen a successful pilot program conducted on the Gold Coast. Through this case study, we hope to continue to grow

the offering of Squash programs across the country. Program development has been well supported by new insights in squash participation rates and trends from sources such as the Australian Sports Commission's Ausplay survey and other market insight reports. This information is positioning the sport with a strong evidence base through which to drive further growth in new and existing markets, in a sustainable manner.

Coach Education Working Group Report

Coaches play a crucial role in the development of all athletes, including the development of junior Squash players who are integral to the future success of the sport both at grass roots and at high performance levels. The Education Working Group aspires to improve the coaching and refereeing systems in Australia for the betterment of the sport. Members of the EWG utilise their wealth of knowledge and experience to actualise Squash Australia's 4-year goal of valuing and training Squash personnel to guarantee competent referees and coaches to deliver the sport in Australia.

In 2018, the focus within the EWG has been the success of multiple coaching events, including the National Coaches Conference, the WSF World Coaches Conferences and the WSF Level 2 Coaching. The National Coaches Conference attracted numerous participants over a weekend in Melbourne alongside a WSF Level 1 coaching course and the Australian National Championships. The World Coaches Conference featured highly esteemed presenters from around the world such as Allistair McCaw and attracted numerous international and domestic Squash coaches. Alongside the event was the WSF Level 2 Coaching Course which not only offered an opportunity for more coaches in Australia to attain higher accreditation, it also permitted the upskilling of three existing Australian WSF Level 1 tutors to Level 2. These two events demonstrate the work that has been done to align the domestic coaching content with the WSF coaching

accreditation. This year has also seen the migration of coaching data to the CRM, with work continuing to be done to ensure that all Australian coaches are accredited and meet all integrity requirements such as Working with Children Checks. This transfer of data to the CRM should, in the coming years, see the automation of re-accreditation and expiry reminders. The high quality of Australian referees were also highlighted at the successful Gold Coast Commonwealth Games, with 13 Australian referees making up nearly half of the Squash Technical Officials.

Looking ahead to 2019, Squash Australia will work closely with the EDWG to bring a WSF Level 3 Coaching Course to Australia.

Facilities Working Group Report

The Facilities Working Group (FWG) was chaired by Squash Australia Director, Mick Jaroszewicz. The FWG has continued to improve the National Facilities Strategy with an updated version due early 2019. The strategy has become a very important document which is influencing Local Government Authorities perceptions around the sport, this strategy was presented at the 2018 National Park and Leisure Conference.

The relocation of the squash courts used at the 2018 Commonwealth Games as part of the Legacy Project was the most significant infrastructure project of the year. This new facility (the Carrara Squash Centre) based the Gold Coast, QLD marks the first Squash Australia run facility. The Centre has 6 courts with interchangeable walls meaning they can be used for doubles and/or singles and 1 glass court for major international events. The Carrara Squash Centre is also the training base for the National Academy and the home of the Carrara Squash Club.





This much needed facility allows Squash Australia to develop and pilot new programs and initiatives prior to sharing the learnings with facilities across the country. This truly is a watershed moment in Squash Australia's rich history.

Squash Australia has also been able to improve its relationships with facilities across the country via the Community Engagement Coordinator (CEC) network. Whilst the CEC's do have a focus on the roll out of SportyHQ, they have also been able to visit a number of facilities to discuss CentreMark and to collect some basic facility data. This data includes the key successes and challenges that facilities are facing. This data is then shared across facilities to install best practice facility management leading to a thriving network of facilities across the country.

- Live streaming of almost every event which attracted large audiences across the country and internationally, courtesy of Leon Faustini and his company Reneon,

The King and Queen of our sport Cam White and Sarah Fitz-Gerald, once again captured the Men's and Women's Australian Open crowns for the 16th and 9th times respectively, although White was forced into a hotly contested three game decider by 2018 Australian Open Squash Champion Rex Hedrick in the final. To underscore the future of the sport five of the ten singles events were won by junior players.

History Panel Report

After a number of false starts, the Awards and History Panel, now has a clear view of what it wants to deliver for Squash in Australia.

Awards: To identify those involved today and in the past with Squash in Australia, who are deserving of a national award, granted by the Government, the Sports Hall of Fame, or any other national body, who have not yet been so recognised. To that end, the first task that has commenced, is the tabulation of all those who have previously been honoured. When complete, we will be able to see who deserves a recommendation for an upgrade, and who has deserved an award but has not yet received one. The panel will then make recommendations to the Board of Squash Australia to nominate those people for the relevant awards.

History: There is a mass of historical data, documents and artefacts scattered around the country, in the care of aging stakeholders. While a document scanning and storage strategy should be relatively straightforward to create, the implementation may be more challenging. The artefacts, on the other hand need to be stored in a suitable location, and when that is found, that will be the time for an appeal nationally for items to be stored therein

Attracting players from Korea, Malaysia, India, Hong Kong, New Zealand and Australia, the event proved wholly successful with good local media coverage in the Canberra Times and on WIN TV; local players getting the opportunity to play in the qualifiers; Peter Nuttall getting the local wildcard in the main draw; enthusiastic and knowledgeable spectators (not much space sadly); player post-match interviews; and, canteen provided all week by our Juniors Committee. Rex Hedrick met Addeen Idrakie from Malaysia in the final, kept his flawless form and took out the title. It was a very small team that managed to get everything done and our thanks goes to all who helped out. Visiting players spoke enthusiastically about their experiences in the National Capital with local families and around the courts. We hope to be back in 2019!

Woden Squash Centre is owned by Squash ACT and is well placed in a local sporting precinct on the southern side of Canberra. Within a stone's throw are the main sporting venues of ACT Cricket, AFL and Ice Hockey along with an Olympic size swimming pool. A large carpark, full each working day, sits opposite us and there's a steady flow of pedestrians and spectators passing by. With our main wall being graffitied, steps were taken to rectify the situation. We engaged local mural artist, James Small, and a brilliant, powerful mural now covers the wall.

Squash ACT remains in discussions with neighbours exploring building project options. Should we go down the path of a building project, complications brought about through land use restriction and lease variation, an inconveniently positioned electrical easement and, ultimately, cost present considerable, possibly insurmountable, hurdles.



The Woden Courts are a valuable Squash ACT asset that must remain central to future planning. Still, we explore options with the goals of building player numbers and looking to provide the best facilities possible to squash players of all abilities.

On the local front, junior numbers continue to grow, there are various social comps running and we see a good number of schools utilising courts. The Colleges Championships ran successfully and a Primary School Gala Day was hosted by the Islamic School of Canberra for the Weston Community Centre 40th year celebrations.

Squash ACT published its first newsletter, The Squash Rally, in August this year bringing local news and updates to all involved in squash. We look to put out between 4 and 6 editions each year. With SportyHQ, Russell Weatherburn has been engaged to ensure that clubs are supported in getting their players, tournaments and news on and out through SportyHQ. Russell also took on the task of producing The Squash Rally, which has proven very welcome. In 'Club Land', Queanbeyan Courts are up and running at Q-one Indoor Sports, a club is being formed at Yass and comp squash is now being played at Next Gen in Lyneham.

I cannot finish without mentioning that Juniors 'boss', Helen Southwell, has called a day on 18 years of outstanding service to Junior Squash in the ACT. Helen has given enormously to the sport at its most vital level and she leaves us having cared deeply for every child who played and making it her business to see opportunities were given to all. We wish Helen well knowing our thanks is supported by all who have been involved in junior squash at a national level.

Finally, we acknowledge the efforts of every squash player and squash supporter whether club-based, Masters, Junior or social who each play a part in building the ACT and surrounding region squash community.

2017/18 Squash NT Annual Report

The 2017-18 Financial Year saw a few changes to the staffing and leadership of Squash NT. Squash NT continued to operate the Darwin Squash Centre which was lucky enough to host the Australian Open back in November. We welcomed Squash Australia staff and players from both Australia and overseas to Darwin for the event. This event would not have happened without the generous support of the NT Government who provided a significant amount of funding through their Sport & Recreation Department. Our local squash community were also great supporters of this event with a number of people offering to volunteer their time to contribute to this major event as well as those who just came along to watch some great squash and support the players.

The annual NT Open was held in May with a PSA Womens 10K and Mens 5K held alongside a local graded event. Once again we welcomed pro players from Australia and overseas to Darwin for the four day tournament. Aussie Christine Nunn defeated Rachael Grinham in the Women's final while Malaysia's TsZ Kwan Lau defeated Rhys Dowling in front of his home crowd in the men's.

Our Affiliated Clubs (Darwin Squash Association, Gove Squash Club, Alice Springs Squash Association and NT Masters Squash Association) all continued to run their various competitions in their regions throughout the year. The Alice Springs Squash Association maintained their commercial arrangement with a local gym, which has reduced their expenses tremendously and allowed them to run their local competition on the remaining courts.

We have also had great success with our referee program a big thank you to Chris Sinclair and Nathan Turnbull for their commitment to officiating, funding well spent, seeing 6 Queensland referees selected for the Commonwealth Games.

2017/18 Squash NSW Annual Report

2018 has passed quickly and during this time Squash NSW has welcomed three new directors to the board. Gary Somerville former Squash NSW CEO joined the board at the 2017 AGM along with Geoff Rhodes and John Small more recently. All three men have been involved in the sport for many years and bring their expertise in management, financial management, policy and governance and refereeing.

Melody Francis was appointed Squash NSW Head Junior Coaching in March 2018. Melody brings a new approach, drive and culture to junior squash in the state. Not only does Melody bring her squash experience to our young players she is a qualified Pilates teacher and is studying physiotherapy. Melody's additional knowledge on body strengthening and conditioning provides further benefit to our young athletes. Melody is looking to the future with changes to the structure of the squad in a number of areas with a focus on development squads and empowerment of players through decision making and accountability for self and team. Squash NSW looks forward to working with Melody to further develop the junior program.

Squash NSW has seen growth in registered clubs and players from regional NSW over the last 12 months with clubs who have never affiliated with the association now affiliating. This is a positive step for the sport and has been achieved through the continued efforts of Squash NSW Director Tim Toohey. Tim has visited over 30 regional centres in the last 12 months and has become the conduit between metro and regional squash in the state. Tim was recognised for his work by Sport NSW at a recent ceremony at Government House.

The growth of squash in regional NSW continues to develop and can be directly attributed to the dedicated hard-working clubs and their members. Country NSW player numbers doubled last financial year and have continued to grow this year. With the introduction of the Regional Sport Infrastructure Fund by the NSW Government a number of regional clubs are working with local councils to ensure that squash facilities are included in new regional sporting developments. We are optimistic that those clubs will secure grants for new squash facilities in the

The Greater Sydney Commission, District Sport Facility Plans for the Greater Sydney Region was formed in late 2017. The commission is working with sporting associations to map all sporting facilities across Sydney to help identify future growth areas for development. Squash NSW has provided information on our sport and have attended a number of forums at the Office of Sport to meet with Local Councils in the development of the plan. The outcomes for the District Plan will be finalised late 2018 and we are hopeful for positive outcomes for our sport.

There was a small decline in pennant numbers in the Sydney metro competition this year. To address the decline in pennant participation a 3-person team format was introduced to some districts. This change has been well supported by players and clubs. Over 400 players were surveyed on the changes with the results showing overwhelming support for the new format. Squash NSW will continue to work with clubs and players to adapt and develop the competition to meet modern lifestyles and demands.

Looking to 2019 Squash NSW is preparing for a smooth transition to the Sporty HQ CRM platform for our clubs and players. The move to Sporty HQ is a major undertaking of the sport and there is much work to do to ensure that the transition is a positive experience for our members.

Finally, I would like to thank the NSW Squash community, from centre owners, committee members, players and parents who are out there driving the competitions, running tournaments, coaching, refereeing and playing, our sport does not thrive without your enthusiasm and passion for squash.

Squash SA Annual Report

Squash SA has, over the past eight months, had an interim management model in place while the Board enacted the process to appoint a CEO. On behalf of the Board and myself I would like to sincerely thank Grant Norman and Roger Sanderson for their excellent work in overseeing Squash SA and the Southern Bar, Gaming and Bistro facility respectively, during this time. I also want to thank the Squash SA Board of Directors for their support in entrusting me in this exciting and challenging role.

I come to the role with extensive experience in executive roles in Government, in the political sphere and Sport, and most recently in the role as the CEO of the Norwood Football Club in the SANFL. I have also had experience with the management of a gaming facility, similar to the Southern, in my position with the Norwood Football Club; experience that I will be drawing on in this role. In my first month I have endeavoured to familiarise myself with the operational aspects of both Squash SA and the Southern and also looked to establish contact with the key stakeholders in both areas, a task I will continue to focus on in the coming months.

The challenges faced by the Board and myself are significant, especially so in relation to the Southern. As was reported last year the Darlington Corridor Upgrade project, which is now adjacent the Southern, is significantly affecting the running of this business. This level of road work activity will last for over six months before the project will have migrated past the Southern. The impact on our business by these road works cannot be under-estimated and has necessitated a doubling of efforts to promote the Southern with our current patrons and the enactment of strategies to attract new patrons during the difficult next six months.

It is still the case, as was identified in last year's annual report, that we face challenges such as changes to gaming legislation which affects the Association's ability to generate funds to put back into community squash and racquetball programs and reductions in government funding. This is even more evident in the Governments recent budget, resulting in greater emphasis on sporting organisations such as ourselves, to explore new commercial avenues and generate alternative revenues. Given these challenges our strategic focus and our priorities will be magnified in two of our five strategic pillars, being, Club and venue development and Marketing and communication.

Squash is still rated as the healthiest sport in the world judged against criteria such as Cardio-vascular endurance, calories burnt, low injury rate, flexibility, muscular endurance and strategic game skills application. So, we have a great product and with Squash entering a new era of flexibility with the advent of moveable walled courts that can become multi-use sports spaces and then converted back to squash courts within minutes, we have a new approach to encourage facility growth. This innovation is important in as much as it changes the business model for squash facilities

from purely a stand-alone option to a multi-sports facility which is much more appealing for schools, universities, councils and community recreation centres.

Our most immediate focus in relation to our aim to increase participation is to highlight our successes and use the experience gained to migrate these successful approaches to our other target areas. We are endeavouring to use a partnership approach with peak bodies, other sports, education at all levels and government to achieve our ends. We are employing a comprehensive strategic approach where we will be engaging organisations at all levels to ensure our message of the value of involvement in our sport gets through

That is not to say we won't continue to support all our current programs and competitions and I want to thank all the volunteers, staff and club personnel who work long hours to ensure our pennant competition, tournaments, squash programs, and elite programs flourish.

As was reported last year we now have our office at the Tonsley Innovation District, and one year after establishing our new base and the 24/7 glass court, the court continues to be a great asset in promoting the sport to new people and the greater Adelaide community. It has even got to the stage where on nights where our Tonsley Corporate Cup is being run, others that may normally look to book the court have ventured out to nearby centres to book courts and possibly join squash clubs.

One of our rising stars, Alex Haydon, has continued to lead the way for South Australian females and Australian juniors with multiple awards and national selections over the past 12 months. Alex won the SA Junior Sports Star of the Year, at the South Australian Sports Awards on the same night that Chris Dittmar was inducted into the SA Sports Hall of Fame, which was great for Squash and a special achievement for Alex. Alex's national junior selections this year were against New Zealand in the Trans-Tasman test series in January and at the World Junior Championships in India in July 2018. To top it off she was the first SA player in over fifteen years to be selected in an Australian senior team for the World Women's Teams Championships.

Chris Dittmar finally got his much-deserved place in the South Australian Sports Hall of Fame and it was great that fellow hall of fame member and fellow former Alberton Squash Club member, Vicki Cardwell, was there on the night to see it happen. "Ditts" had a magnificent career, finishing runner up five times to Jansher Khan in the world opens, captaining the Australian World Teams Champions, being the number one ranked player in the world and winning three Australian Open Championships, as well as many other significant tournaments. He was the last award for the night but he got up and stole the show telling stories about his days on tour and adversity at tournaments.

In conclusion Squash SA believe there are fruitful and exciting times ahead for the country regions of South Australia with many regional councils hearing about the success and flexibility of centres like the Rex in the Barossa and the ARC at Campbelltown, that have moveable squash court walls. New courts have sprung up in Kadina already with 3 courts currently under construction in Pt Pirie and Pt Lincoln respectively. Squash SA is confident that these flexible squash spaces will spark other councils to consider including a pod of three movable wall courts in their new recreation centre plans.

The report concluded that a State owned facility is critical to help secure the future of Squash. The next step is for a business case study to be compiled, which identifies the commercial options for such a centre.

Country Teams Championships

Country week is happening in September 2018 with the expectation of an increase in player numbers to some 280 with teams stretching from Broome to Esperance and East to Kalgoorlie.

WA Oper

WA Open attracted over 100 participants this year. The event was well supported locally, nationally and internationally with many interstate and international players participating.

Mike Corren continued his winning streak in taking out his 7th WA Open title whilst Sue Hillier won her 8th, 30 years after her first victory.

Masters Squash in WA remains well supported, organized and social. Congratulations to Roger Campbell and his team for maintaining such an active section.

The Group has elected to adopt the AustralianAccounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure requirements (established by AASB 1053 Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements).

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the Corporations Act 2001. Sqaush Australia is a not-for-profit entity for the purposes of preparing the financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared using the significant accounting policies and measurement bases summarised below.

(a) Basis of consolidation

The Group financial statements consolidate those of the Parent Company and its subsidiary as of 30 June 2018. The parent controls a subsidiary if it is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the subsidiary and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the subsidiary. The subsidiary has a reporting date of 30 June.

All transactions and balances between Group companies are eliminated on consolidation, including unrealised gains and losses on transactions between Group companies. Where unrealised losses on intra-group asset sales are reversed on consolidation, the underlying asset is also tested for impairment from a Group perspective. Amounts reported in the financial statements of subsidiaries have been adjusted where necessary to ensure consistency with the accounting policies adopted by the Group.

Revenue and Other Income is recognised on an accruals basis. Pursuant to Revenue from grant income is recognised on an accruals basis. Pursuant to AASB1004, Not-for-profit organisations recognise contributions in the form of government grant has a revenue when the entity obtains control of the contribution. If the government grant has a condition whereby the contribution has to be refunded if the conditions are not met, then revenue is not recognised until the conditions are met. Any unexpended grant funds are recognised as a liability. Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(c) Operating expenses
