The angel said my place was ready In heaven far above And that I would have to leave behind All those I dearly love



HIS STORY

Noel Donald Matthews was born on December 19, 1951, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to Ruby Matthews and raised by his stepfather Clifton Grandy. He was educated in the public school system in Philadelphia County. He received his high school diploma from Benjamin Franklin High School for Boys.

Noel began working at 14 years old after school at the Peanut Store, located in the 2100 block of Ridge Avenue. His first job taught him valuable lessons in financial matters and money management. He learned to be "penny wise and a dollar smart." He saved his money and never asked anyone for financial assistance.
