

He served his country proudly from 1942 to 1945 as Seaman 1st Class. He was a cook and also manned a 24 mm gun aboard the USS San Carlos in the Pacific Theater. In October of 1944, he bravely took part in the Battle of Leyte Gulf near a chain of the Philippine islands. The

battle is considered to be the largest naval battle of World War II. Alex was a proud Navy man and even prouder World War II Veteran.

He met the love of his life Angeline (Angie) Jochim at a dance in Judson, ND. This was the beginning of their unwavering love story. The two were united in marriage on June 23, 1947 in Flasher, ND and spent the next 70 years as husband and wife. Together they lovingly and "energetically" raised their 11 children. Alex worked very hard to support his large family. Notably, he was a print setter for the Bismarck Tribune for 31 years - retiring in 1986. Alex's clever wit and smart sense of humor continues to radiate through all of his children. Alex was a generous man, loving husband, father, brother, grandfather, great-grandfather.
