1.0 PRESIDENTS REPORT

2018 was a challenging year for the organisation.

The Board lost three experienced members. Nicci Rossouw, then President, choose not to stand for re-election at the February AGM, while Catherine Swift, then Vice President, and Peter Wright chose to stand down at the March Board meeting. At that meeting I was nominated as President, with Vice President Lee-Anne Carpenter and Finance Director Kal Desai. At that stage only two of the six remaining board members had been on the Board for a full term.

Subsequently at the March Board meeting a highly conservative budget was tabled forecasting a \$65,000 loss for the 2018 financial year. This came on top of a \$27,000 loss in the 2017 financial year. Clearly this was an untenable situation which could not be allowed to eventuate.

A search was conducted to fill the 3 vacant Board roles and in late April we appointed Kevin Quick, Angela Burton and Teesha Melville. It needs to be clearly noted that these people joined the Board knowing that we were under significant financial pressure but accepted the challenge anyway.

During this time the board and management sought to make savings on expenditure and explore alternative avenues for funding including possible philanthropic contributions. In addition, we were in regular communication with VicHealth and Sport and Recreation Victoria in relation to grant funding. In late May we were advised by VicHealth that we had qualified for a grant under the GPIS program. (Details of that program can be found in the body of the report).

In June Fiona Young, our CEO tendered her resignation, finishing her 10 year journey with S&RV on July 1st. This was particularly challenging given our circumstances. It was clear that the organisation did not have the resources to hire a new CEO. After discussion with the Board I assumed the role of Acting CEO as a volunteer until such time as our financial position was resolved and a replacement could be hired.

The resignation of our CEO also opened up a number of opportunities to look at the management structure and to re-engage with the organisation's members, influencers and participants.

As part of that process the Board received a presentation from the CEO and President of Squash Australia relating to Sport Australia's "One Sport" model and a possible transition to a version of that for the two organisations. This ranged from delegation of day to day management to Squash Australia, reporting to the board of SquashVic, to a model utilising shared services where possible. The Board resolved to undertake a shared services approach initially until we could explore what "One Sport" meant in practice.

During the changeover from paid CEO to volunteer CEO it became clear that a significant portion of the squash and racquetball community were keen to be involved in volunteering and shaping the future of the organisation. The Board agreed that it would seek feedback and guidance from its membership through the formation of an advisory group. It was particularly through the efforts of Kevin Quick that the group was organised and its first meeting was held in October, followed by two further meetings. The group ultimately formed a series of subgroups with particular areas of interest in order to assist the Board and management.

With staff and management resources still very low, these subgroups will form an important part of the structure of the organisation going forward. Kevin will continue to act as coordinator and report to the Board regarding direction and progress. It is a credit to the community that we have people willing to dedicate their time and efforts to this project. While we have been challenged, we have still been able to deliver some significant events and projects.

S&RV is there to help its members when they need it. We may not always be visible on a day to day level but our affiliates can access us to support a submission to local council, auspicing for grants, provide access to tournament and pennant software, provide detailed session plans for both squash and racquetball for kids and adults, provide education for coaches and referees and coordinate the provision of referees for tournaments and pennant and day to day advice.

Through the 'Change our Game' initiative via Sport and Rec Victoria we were funded to provide greater involvement of women and girls in key roles in the sport. We have provided free attendance for women at level one coaching courses, provided Selina Shaik the opportunity to progress her coaching qualifications to level 2 and sponsored a 'Women in Squash' event run by Leigh Evans at Hume City Squash Club.

The new tournament, pennant and club management software system, Sporty HQ, was rolled out January. I acknowledge the incredible dedication of Tony Nash and others from Club Circuit as well as Bryan Bird and Brendon Perry for their time and persistence to get it over the line in time for pennant.

Mega Squash and Racquetball 24 hour ran for the 8th year now at 3 venues, MSAC, Wodonga and Bairnsdale and raised a record \$40,000 for MS. We thank Ted Vale and the Board of the Mulgrave Country Club and its squash club for their support and sponsorship in running the 2018 Australian Squash Open.

My thanks to Darcy St John and Sam Ejtemai for their commitment to setting up the 2018 Talent Development Academy program and coaching the team that represented Victoria at the AJC's in September. Thanks also to Marcia Ratcliffe, Vicki Cardwell and Garry Pedersen for their commitment to the squad. Thanks also to Garry Pedersen who ran the regional development program for country and outer metropolitan clubs involving juniors and coaches. Garry won coach of the year at last years Squash Australia awards. He is a passionate and innovative coach.

I thank all the grand prix circuit clubs for both squash and racquetball who run fantastic tournaments which are the backbone of the sport. Welcome to Wodonga who joined the GP circuit this year. Numbers are at record levels so far this year.

Finally, I wish to thank the outgoing Board for their support, commitment and endeavour as we worked through the intense financial and structural challenges facing the organisation in 2018 and early 2019.

At year end Squash and Racquetball Vic will now make a small surplus and is now in a position to employ a General Manager to take charge of the organisation and move it out of caretaker mode. While significant progress has been made, and staff structures and finances stabilised the new Board and management will need the support of everyone in the community to ensure we have a viable Squash and Racquetball Victoria going forward.

2.4 Committee Reports

Pennant

As has been the case in recent years S&RV conducted a 10 round Summer League, a 15 round winter league and a 10 round spring league. These leagues are open to all clubs but mainly aimed at teams from public centres and universities who are unable to compete in Club Circuit. Most entries are from clubs that fall into this category.

NWSL & SSL teams have been playing in these leagues for the past 50 years after graduating from their more local leagues. In the case of Westerfolds, Templestowe who have teams in both SSL & Club Circuit most of their teams continue to participate in SSL and as the players continue to climb enter these teams into S&RV State Leagues.

As the S&RV winter pennant is played mainly while Club Circuit is in recess prize money was offered but did little to attract any of the top class players. As S&RV is required to cater to the needs of the non Club Circuit players we will continue to offer to these leagues a S&RV alternative.

Squash and Racquetball GO!



Squash and Racquetball Victoria were successful in receiving funding from VicHealth under the Growing Participation in Sport grant. The program development has been undertaken by Meredith Hodson and has made significant progress since mid January 2019. Squash and Racquetball GO! Program is targeted towards inactive 12-17yr old participants, as outlined in the grant guidelines.

Currently the initial pilot program is being tested using 'come and try' sessions across metro and regional locations - including but not limited to Lilydale, Portland, Ballarat, MSAC and Stawell. The valuable market research and feedback from these sessions is being collated to develop a 6-week program running in Term 2. Our aim is to create a program that fits not only what a 12-17yr old will find fun and engaging, but to alter the current perception that squash and racquetball "has disappeared". Squash and Racquetball GO! is all about exposing juniors to the sport in an inclusive and encouraging manner, plus hopefully creating life-long players.



Referees

2018 was another busy year for Victorian referees. A number of our State and National accredited referees were up for re-assessment which was completed successfully. In addition, we had two of our club level referees successfully upgrade their skills and attain State level. A number of potential referees are currently working through the theoretical components at club level.

The referees maintained a constant presence at the various tournaments hosted throughout the calendar year. These tournaments were used as opportunities for reassessment, coaching and general support (in particular the junior tournaments to educate and assist the juniors).

Rent-a-ref is becoming increasingly popular with a record number of requests (particularly finals) occurring in the spring season of 2018. At times, resources were stretched to the limit but all requests were successfully fulfilled.

Sincere thanks to all the committee for their tireless efforts and in addition, Damien Green and Harvey Bowlt for their support and mentoring.

Governance

The primary accomplishment of the governance committee this year was the implementation of a nominations committee. The purpose of the nominations committee is to:

- Review the nominations for Director positions,
- Assess all nominations received against the needs of the organisation,
- Provide a report for all election voters to duly consider, and
- Provide a report for the Board to duly consider when filling appointed Director positions.

It is critical to note that all recommendations by the nominations committee are nonbinding. For more information on the nomination committee, please refer to the terms of reference (available through the office and on the website). The introduction of the terms of reference complements the constitutional reform to align the organisations with current thinking around composition practices and will help ensure the organisation meets the gender quotas implemented by Sport and Recreation Victoria.

Outside of this achievement the governance committee has had a quiet year. The committee referred the decision regarding the suitability of the President acting as a Voluntary CEO to the Board. With the Board structure changing next year and longer terms for Board members, it is envisaged that the governance committee will return to a regular meeting schedule and continue ensuring the governance structures, processes, and polices of S&RV are in line with contemporary thinking around good governance and suited to S&RV.

Racquetball

There were six Victorian Racquetball Grand Prix Tournament Circuit events held in 2018, receiving 777 entries, an average of 130 per event, plus the 2018 Australian Open which was again superbly hosted by two S&RV members, the Commercial Club Albury - Squash and Racquetball Section and the Wodonga Squash and Racquetball Association, securing a further 239 entries.

A very special thank you to each of our 2018 tournament directors; Ian Chalmers (ESRA & Victorian Opens), Barry Patterson (Wangaratta Open), Elisha Mitchell (Geelong Classic), Russell McLean (Ballarat Open), Chris Fuhrmeister (Lakes Classic), plus Ross Falconer (Australian Open), and their respective committees, as they do a fantastic job to keep each event and the Victorian tournament circuit running smoothly, plus make remarkable contributions to the sport of racquetball on a day by day basis.

Shane Skidmore has once again been a great asset for the sport and attends all events. During 2018. He was very active, being heavily involved at each event in the running of the tournament, plus introducing several new initiatives which have proven to be most beneficial for the sport of racquetball.

During the year there were six events, including the Australian Open, live streamed which attracted large audiences, courtesy of Leon Faustini and his company Reneon, who covered the total cost for all events, for which the total racquetball community are most grateful.

Special thanks also to Peter French who has been coordinating all the Australian Racquetball Facebook postings for the past four years and keeping everyone up to date with what is happening in racquetball, including regular event filming and updates.

A very special mention to the following players for their outstanding support; Peter French, Charlie Stevenson, Garry Pedersen, Sue Dunlop, Ryan McCarter, Rob Hay, Anthony Dzioba, Ross Falconer, Brandon Morgan, plus the God Mother of our sport Heather Meldrum, who played in all six Victorian Grand Prix Circuit events held in 2018. Peter French and Sue Dunlop also played in all five of our National Grand Prix Circuit events, a fantastic effort.

Victorian players dominated both the Victorian and National Grand Prix Circuits in 2018 - congratulations to all those winners listed on the Events pages of the Annual report.

Victorian members took out nine of the ten National singles titles, six of which were juniors, at the 2018 Australian Open Championships, held at the Commercial Club Albury during October, plus all ten Victorian Open singles titles held at Genesis Wantirna in July.

Victorian members also claimed eight of the nine National and all ten Victorian Grand Prix Circuit Singles Champion Awards for 2018, along with five of the six national and all five Victorian GP Circuit Doubles Champion Awards.

The President's Choice Commercial Club Junior Scholarship Award sponsored by Andrew Sobolewski and all the Grand Prix tournament hosts was won by Xavier Brigden and he received \$200 to put towards his coaching and training expenses, plus free entry into every Grand Prix racquetball event held in Australia in 2019.

The inaugural Squash and Racquetball Victoria Awards for the most promising junior boy and girl under 15 years of age were won by nine-year-old Connor Haberecht and ten-yearold Amelia Brigden respectively, with each receiving \$250 in private coaching from Cam White and Sarah Fitz-Gerald respectively.

The Australian Open Teams Challenge comprised participants from twenty-four clubs, with the Commercial Club annexing the first prize of \$250, Wodonga received \$150 for second place and Geelong LTC taking out third place and winning \$100.

Special recognition also to the King and Queen of our sport, Cam White and Sarah Fitz-Gerald, both undefeated for eighteen and ten years respectively, and who are also fantastic ambassadors for racquetball.

In 2018 White won his seventeenth Australian Open crown, this is seriously bordering on Heather McKay territory who was unbeaten in squash for eighteen years, with Fitz-Gerald claiming her tenth National Women's Open title.

The Nursery event for our sport is the Victorian Primary Schools Racquetball Team's Competition which commenced in 2005, and consistently draws entries from across the state. Congratulations to all teams who reached the 2018 State Finals held at MSAC, and for the fourth successive year it was Mt. Waverley Primary School taking the honours for the Boy's title, with St. Mary's Bairnsdale claiming the Girl's crown.

Racquetball in this state would not survive without the enormous input and support provided by a large army of dedicated racquetball personnel, including my fellow Victorian Racquetball Committee members, who I would like to pay very special thanks too.

Finance & Risk

Squash & Racquetball Victoria ended the 2018 financial year with revenues of \$486,891, a 5% decline from 2017, driven mainly by lower Grants revenues.

Membership revenues were broadly steady year on year.

The overall net profit for the year of \$5,230, compared to a loss of \$26,973 in 2017, was primarily driven by a lower costs base. The key driver was having a volunteer CEO after the resignation of Fiona which led to a large reduction of staff salaries.

5.1 Professional Squash Association

The Australian Open Squash

Mulgrave Country Club hosted all the action of the prestigious Australian Open Championships.

Malaysian master Low Wee Wern claimed her third straight PSA World Tour title, when she defeated Egypt's Hana Ramadan in the Women's final.

In the Men's Open, Hometown hero Rex Hedrick claimed his first Australian Open crown, following his 3-0, 61-minute victory against tournament third seed, Dimitri Steinmann.



The 29-year-old, finally secured a major tournament win in his home state, an honour that previously eluded him in his illustrious career.

August, after four days of competition at the Bendigo Squash Centre, Christine Nunn and Sean Conroy claimed victories in the Women's and Men's Open finals respectively.

Nunn continued her amazing run of form to take out her fifth PSA World Tour title in succession, defeating tournament second seed, Sarah Cardwell.

Plenty was also expected from the all-international Men's Open final, with second seed Conroy taking on third seed Enzo Corigliano. Conroy was victorious, as both players turned on an exciting showcase of squash throughout the 59-minute contest.

6.0 2018 STATE JUNIOR SQUASH TEAM

Talent Development Academy

In 2018 the junior high-performance program in Victoria was re-branded as the 'Talent Development Academy'. With this saw the introduction of two new program coordinators and coaches, Darcy St John and Sam Ejtemai, who were supported by continuing program delivery coaches Vicki Cardwell and Garry Pedersen. With a deep background in organisational development, change and performance psychology, coupled with extensive high-performance Squash experience, St John and Ejtemai aimed to re-imagine the approach to talent development in Victorian Squash.

The number of athletes participating in high performance programs in Victoria had begun to decrease over time, with less than 20 athletes participating in 2017. Furthermore, individual and team performances at national events were becoming progressively less competitive. Changing the way players were identified, developed and retained in the sport was generally accepted to be a key priority. Prioritisation was given to enhancing the experience of athletes participating in the high-performance program, whilst also focusing on achieving better performance outcomes for Victorian players.

The 2018 program attracted 34 new and returning athletes. The existing playing group had expressed a clear sense of dissatisfaction, indicating that the coaching model was no longer fit for purpose. In addition to this, there were observable levels of disengagement with Victorian Squash training programs, resulting in inconsistent attendances and fulfillment of session objectives.

In response to this, the TDA program for 2018 was simplified and took on a readjusted focus. It was agreed that focusing on coaching innovations or introducing new performance training practices would not result in any meaningful benefits at the time. The rationale was that with a lack of trust in the high-performance program, athletes were not genuinely engaging with or absorbing information that was delivered by various highly experience coaches. As such, the primary focus became establishing a culture of high performance within the playing group and broader junior squash community. This was to be underpinned by targeted sessions focusing on athlete professionalism, commitment, teaming, self-insight and shared respect between coaches and players.

Throughout the training year, Academy athletes were supported to set challenging performance and progress goals, which were meaningful for their own respective level and aspirations. These were used to guide individual development objectives and allowed program coaches to gain greater insight into each athlete's playing style and goals. In addition to this, monthly training sessions included a variety of technical on-court training, tournament preparation support and athletic ability uplift through strength and endurance sessions.

The pinnacle junior squash event for the year took place in Darwin for 2018. Over a 2week period 17 of our Talent Development Academy athletes competed in the individual Australian Junior Championships, followed by a team based competition. The Victoria Junior State team had their most competitive placing in the team event for over 5 years, finishing in 3rd place. This was a meaningful improvement for the team compared to previous years, usually finishing between 4th and 5th place. With much of the state team playing within their age groups for the first of their 2 years, the squad is placed competitively to continue form into future national events. At the conclusion of 2018, feedback from the playing group and observations made by coaches showed a considerable improvement in the level of engagement and vigour towards the high-performance program. Key improvement areas for the year included establishing a greater sense of connectedness between the coaching staff, playing group and families, more consistent attendance, proactive athlete behaviour to set and review performance goals and an overall uplift in consistent on court performances.

Heading into the 2019 year, the Talent Development Academy is positioned well to begin introducing significant structural delivery changes. With the positive momentum gained in 2018, and having established a strong culture amongst the playing group, the program will now look to introduce greater innovation in coaching methods and introduce cross functional high-performance capabilities.
