# **REVIEW OF 2022 ESRA OPEN RACQUETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Following the closure of the Westerfolds Bayswater courts the 2022 ESRA Open Racquetball Championships were played for the first time, at the state of the art Tonic Squash and Gym located in Dromana on the Mornington Peninsula. This was the first racquetball tournament held since our lives and sport have been ravaged by COVID-19 - only one tournament has been run nationally since the SA Open in March 2020. Considering all this, we were delighted by number of players who were keen to get back on the court in both singles and doubles; with very strong fields in both the Men's and Women's Open. Not surprisingly the King of Racquetball Cam White claimed the Men's title, extending his unbeaten record into its twenty second year. First time player, Tonic owner and ex squash champ, Amelia Martin, took out the Women's Open crown in a powerful, convincing display. Tonic's Chris England teaming with Mulgrave's Nelson Turner won the Open Doubles title.

### TRIBUTE TO PAUL VEAR

The whole racquetball community mourns the loss of our grand master, Paul Vear, and this tournament was dedicated to his memory. Clearly the most influential and significant contributor to the sport's development and growth since 1977, Paul had more recently driven resurgent growth of racquetball in Regional Victoria and into other States with the establishment of the National Tournament Circuit. The ESRA tournament committee will attest to the amount of work they had to cover that normally would have been done by Paul. The man was a giant and his passion for racquetball unequaled. It is going to be difficult for us to cover the amount of volunteer work Paul put into our sport.

#### MEN'S OPEN

In the first semi, top seed White ran Wagga's Craig Ambler all around the court to a 21-9, 21-6 victory. The second semi saw second seed Garry Pedersen continuing his more recent dominance over Ryan McCarter edging him out 21-17, 21-17.

The playoff for 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> was a grueling affair with Ambler first dominating, McCarter grinding his way back; coming from behind in the second game, to eventually win 13-21, 21-19, 21-19.

Whilst there were only 5 players, the field was the strongest Women's Open for some time with three of the top five ranked players and the inclusion of former world ranked squash players Amelia Martin and Karen Kronemeyer. This being a 5 player round robin, each player had to play 2 games against the four others. It is a difficult task to play 4 matches in a single day of competition. Martin showed her absolute class, quickly adapting to the bouncy blue ball. She dominated each match winning 21-10, 21-6 (Sally White), 21-7, 21-6 (Sue Dunlop), 21-3, 21-6 (Sarah Quinlivan) and 21-5, 21-6 (Kronemeyer) for a maximum 168 points.

Dunlop showed her experience in her other three matches to take out second place accumulating 143 points. Special tribute to Kronemeyer, who due to squash coaching commitments, could not play until 2pm; on the understanding she would have to play all 8 games without a break. After 6 games with very long rallies, she was unable to continue and had to forfeit. We think sometimes squashies underestimate how tough racquetball can be.

# A GRADE

Played as a six player round robin, Josh McMillan won his pool beating Rob Hay 21-19, 21-11 and Nelson Howard 21-18, 21-12. In the other pool Matt Tench beat Carlos da Silva 21-19, 21-14 and Adrian Sommerfeld 21-17, 21-19.

The final was a tough affair early, with McMillan running over the top of Tench winning 18-21, 21-6, 21-6.
