## Reflections from the Rector (designate)...



Time is largely taken for granted and sometimes wasted. We often feel like we don't have enough of it and some regret not making better use of it.

As I write, I am reflecting on my late mother, Trinidad's life and savouring many special times. Times which I had the privilege of helping her to remember- through stories, photos and many repetitive conversations. Mum had dementia and I am realising now how much it meant to her at the time, to be given her familiar memories, which she could no longer remember for herself and to have us just be with her.



Trinidad worked hard to provide for her family. Despite suffering many setbacks in her early life; being born prematurely, living through the Japanese invasion of the Philippines during the Second World War, moving countries, loosing loved ones, she always picked herself up and carried on. Her work ethic, history, humour, courage, pursuit of education, determination, devotion to her family, piety and honesty are the richest legacy anyone could leave behind.

These qualities have made me and my children the people we are today. She was a calming and inspirational presence in our lives. We will all miss her so very much.

The only thing that we can leave behind which will long endure is what we build into the lives of others. This is also true of the church. What does our presence mean to people in the parish? What will be the legacy we leave behind? Who would miss us if we were no longer here?

#### **GENERAL SYNOD**

The General Synod (GS) is the Church of England's tripartite elected governing body. Its members of laity, clergy and bishops meet two or three times a year to decide on doctrine and policy for the Church.

Revd Carol is an elected clergy member for Southwark diocese and went to the July Synod meeting held in York. Whilst there, as well as listening and voting on various measures, Revd Carol contributed to the debate on bringing more young people's voices onto General Synod and was featured in The Church Times.

If anyone is interested, Revd Carol's Deanery report on GS is available in the church foyer at both All Saints and St Antony's, along with the Church Times article.

The next GS meeting will be held in Westminister in November and will be largely concerned with debating the Prayers for Same Sex blessings and corresponding Pastoral Guidance and rubrics for use.

## Keeping the faitth with .....

I've lost track of time having been in and out of hospital with everything going wrong for me both regarding my health and everything else. None of it was my doing, but because of a lot of pressures from people around me, I lost my home.

The pandemic meant I couldn't sort anything out and I came to live in the parish about 2 years ago. I remembered that before everything went wrong for me, I used to go to church and was quite actively involved. My church used to have a Singing Group for people with brain injuries and dementia, and I used to help with this group. One man who came to it said to me quite offensively that he was going to, 'take away my part of heaven.'

For some reason this came into my mind as my health returned and perhaps it made me remember my church days and so I came to All Saints church which is very near to my house. Up until this point I had only been to All Saints for a one off service and to visit the graveyards as I was interested in local history.

Sue, the Steward was the first person I came across. She was very friendly and helpful. I found out later she volunteers for Croydon Vision who help the partially sighted. This was great because I am partially sighted. I've continued to come because I like the services. I like to hear the choir, I also like the modernisations although it can be a bit muddling sometimes but I'm getting used to it.

I am beginning to come out of the shell that I've felt like over the past few years. I can now feel the warmth of the sun and the breeze. I'm still not able to feel hungry or thirsty but I know I need to eat and drink.

This is the same for my spiritual needs - I know I need to restock and build on my previous knowledge of God and the church. This is why I am coming along to the Confirmation classes. Part of the homework is to read a psalm every day which I have been doing. I have written a psalm of my own and I hope you like it.

I lead a dedicated team of flower ladies who keep All Saints' church decorated with flowers throughout the year with the exception of Advent and Lent when the church, by tradition, is kept bare. Three times a year – Easter, Harvest and Christmas the church is decorated throughout with arrangements on the window sills and with pedestals in key locations.



Otherwise there is one arrangement by the pulpit. We have also occasionally arranged flower festivals. Sometimes our weekly arrangements are in memory of a loved one or to celebrate a special birthday or wedding anniversary.

They are paid for by the member of our congregation requesting the arrangement and an insert in the church weekly notices accompanies the arrangement. #### CONFIRMATION CLASSES.

There are 3, possibly 4 people from All Saints who are interested in being Confirmed. Confirmation is a second opportunity for us to commit ourselves and our lives to God after baptism, and is normally celebrated within the Eucharist.

Unlike most Baptisms where, quite often the candidates are too young to understand the questions answered for them by parents and God-parents, those who come for Confirmation answer questions about their faith for themselves.

Confirmation is administered by a Bishop, who speaks for the larger church community to which candidates are being called to belong.





The structure of the Confirmation classes follow the Eucharist Service:

Week 1: Gathering & Confession

Week 2: The Word of God: The Bible and The Creed

Week 3 : Prayer

Week 4: Holy Communion & Blessing for Dismissal

(sending out / Mission of God)

The first of the Confirmation classes was held at the end of July. The following 3 sessions will be held in October and will be followed by the Confirmation service, at St Mary's Sanderstead on Sunday October 29th at 5pm.





### Progress report on the vision questionnaire



Earlier this year the PCC set up a Project 800 group to plan how to celebrate All Saints 800th anniversary in 2030. At an early stage it was envisaged that part of the celebration activities would be projects to enhance the building for services and other activities. However, before considering detailed building plans it is necessary to develop a vision for the church as this is what the diocese will require before approving plans to change or adapt the building.

It was thought that a crucial first step in developing a new vision for All Saints would be to distribute a questionnaire to the congregation seeking their views on the priorities for All Saints for 2030 and beyond. Very shortly after commissioning the questionnaire the PCC realised that with St. Antony's being used as a church again, we would need to work together and listen to the wider community, revisiting our parish vision and priorities as churches in the parish. The questionnaire could therefore be adapted to provide information to inform the parish wide vision and the vision for the buildings.

The questionnaire was distributed to all those on the Electoral Roll plus others attending All Saints and St. Antony's but not on the Electoral Roll. 75 questionnaires were returned, approximately 50% of those distributed. Following the return of the questionnaires a team of six reviewers comprising representatives of both churches was set up to analyse the responses according to a predetermined analytical framework.

Each questionnaire will be read by two reviewers, so hopefully all comments will be captured. The key findings from the questionnaire will be included in a report distributed to the congregation and others ahead of the Awayday. The purpose of the report is to present information that can be used to inform the discussion at this event. Participants at the Awayday will be able to draw upon this information, along with information and that from other sources, to develop the vision for the parish and the related vision for the use of church buildings.

We hope that people will read the report of the findings from the questionnaire and also come to the Awayday on Saturday 23rd September from 9.30am – 3pm at the Good Shepherd Church, Carshalton Beeches.







## A short history of Croydon Refugee Day Centre



In 2007 there was some civil unrest in Croydon town centre, at that time between Kosovan Refugees. Various Christians from various Croydon Churches felt a calling to do something in response to this as it was happening. So, after much prayer and discussion, through Churches Together it was decided to set up a Refugee Day Centre at West Croydon Baptist Church to engage with and help the people who were involved in the unrest.

Croydon also has the Home Office building Lunar House. one of the two places in the UK where New Arrivals can go to claim Asylum to support for Asylum Seekers.



The Day Centre started providing a safe and welcoming social space for people from these and other international communities to mingle, have a decent freshly cooked meal and receive support like signposting, help with bureaucracy and sometimes food and clothing essentials.

We were often the first people someone met who wasn't an official (Immigration officials, the Police). There were various activities offered over the years (depending on funding and partnerships) So people would be able to join in Music Therapy, English classes, an art table, even knitting.

Mental Health and housing services would come along to engage with their harder-to-reach clients, and it grew to regularly welcome about 100 Refugees, Migrants and Asylum Seekers each week, staffed by a team of volunteers from over 20 different churches.

To get to the Day Centre, New Arrivals needed suitable outdoor clothes and shoes (and perhaps a buggy and a bus ticket) so we looked at developing various outreach projects in the Asylum Hotels themselves. When the pandemic struck - as soon as people were allowed to gather outdoors

Wednesday School transferred to Haling Grove Park. This provided craft and sport and a place for the hotel families to meet each other, which they particularly valued as they were confined to their rooms and there was no social space. Rosie is now the charities' Trustee for Education and Welcome.

Poetry Section They crossed mountains and deserts. They filled the boats They ran away from death and persecution. They sailed into the sea of hope. But the raging waters didn't let them go But the world didn't take care of them

Meanwhile the Tuesday Day Centre re-opened after the Pandemic in a different form providing donated clothes and emergency food and toiletries to those in need by means of a 'personal shopper' for each client or family. Missing the social space, 'Wednesday Welcome' was born to provide the 'relaxing and mingling' element and we currently have folk from about 15 different countries coming to learn English, play table tennis, do some gardening or dancing and eat fruit and cake.

First, the café part. There are no skinny soy frappuccinos, or chai lattes. But people do sit at tables, and drink tea and coffee, and eat some very yummy cakes. There is chat around the tables, and new friendships and acquaintanceships springing up amid healthy debate and warm conversations.



We share communion, we pray, and we raise our voices in worship. Each Sunday's key readings are introduced by being read aloud, and then we are encouraged to debate them and the issues they raise as we grapple with teasing questions.

Who turns up? A bit like the fabled wedding rhyme, some old, some new, some borrowed, and some blue. To be frank nobody blue so far! But equal parts former congregation members, new Hamsey Green people, and a handful of friends from nearby. Ages from 12 months to 94 years. There are about 20 of us, and every week between 10 and 12 of us are here, making friends and lifting our eyes and hearts beyond our everyday lives with a potential weekly Drop-in we are hoping to set up.

The Parade Service was an ideal occasion as so many young people took part - several reading from St John and St Matthew's Gospels about taking action on behalf of those in need.

I told the large congregation that the main objective of The Children's Society is to fight for the hope and happiness of young people across the UK. The Society helps children who experience mental health problems, struggle with drug or alcohol misuse, or are refugee and migrant children seeking safety.

I gave a brief history of The Society, which was started in 1881 by a Christian teacher, Edward Rudolf, who was moved to action to help children in extreme poverty he had seen begging for food. Rudolf founded The Church of England Central Home for "Waifs and Strays". There were two locally, St Agnes Home for Girls and Gordon Home for Boys which didn't shut until 1965. The schools provided a basic education with some skills to help children in the adult world.

I mentioned a young Children's Society carer who has had to look her family since she was 10 and whom The Society has supported. She now speaks out for other young carers and spreads the word about the activities of The Children's Society.

Another story was about a refugee who came to the UK looking for safety. With The Society's help she was able to build a life here in the UK and today this brave girl is a volunteer speaker and staff member for the Society. She passionately works to ensure other vulnerable young people have the support they need as she did.

I thanked All Saints for their valuable support so the Society can continue its work and the Parade Service closed with a prayer for The Society and those precious young people in its care (extract below).

"Inspire and guide The Children's Society to be brave, ambitious, supportive. And trusted in all its work, and to listen, support and act, That hope may be alive in every child."



Behind the scenes Children's Society is working hard to influence many Parliamentary Bills dealing with child safeguarding and wellbeing. To name just a few: Victims Bill, Online Safety Bill, Illegal Migration Bill. You may have heard our CEO, Mark Russell, on the media recently campaigning for free school uniforms - the soaring cost of uniforms is a burden for many families.

Once again, thank you for inviting The Children's Society to All Saints. I thoroughly enjoyed the uplifting service and meeting many of you afterwards. Please continue to pray for the vital work of The Children's Society. Key topics discussed included:

- The Committee's wish to minimise the elements of the minutes which are treated as confidential so as to be as transparent as possible.
- The appointment of additional Safeguarding Officers
- The need to review the specification of the work required before the contract for Grounds Maintenance is retendered.
- A brief update on clearing St Antony's ahead of a deep clean, then subsequent (reduced) lettings to ensure that it is available for more "Church" activities. Also avoiding late night party bookings at both Churches.
- There was a brief discussion of the format for the forthcoming awayday and Richard gave us an update on the responses to the questionnaire.
- Judith and Sue gave an update on Children's activities including Toddlers, Messy Church and Holiday Club. They also hope to repeat the "Missing Body" course next Easter and hopefully run a similar session for local Schools at Christmas.
- It was agreed to pause ADVENTure this year in the absence of any volunteers to lead it
- Michael gave an update on the financial position with Energy costs significantly higher than last year and reduced lettings income in the second half year. The figures will be monitored closely and action taken as appropriate. Michael also sought help in drafting the Pledge 2024 appeal.
- The Wardens reported that all approvals had been received for the installation of Solar Panels on the All Saints Hall and that the Quinquennial surveys would take place at the end of July which may generate further spending needs!
- Margaret updated the PCC on Health & Safety issues and Rosemary reported on matters at Deanery Synod.

A copy of the minutes is on display in Church and the next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 13th September, followed by the Awayday on Saturday 23rd September.
