

In the summer of 1964, Jack & Carolyn Newkirk welcomed their first little girl into a growing family. Victoria Louise was born in Ithaca, New York on June 19, just as Congress was voting on a landmark Civil Rights Act (it passed 73-27). Several days later, the album "A Hard Day's Night" was released by The Beatles, and the National Broadcasting Company approved Gene Roddenberry's first script for an upcoming television series called "Star Trek."

Victoria Louise Newkirk Lierheimer was born into a world of change — but those around her had no idea how her life would soon change the world.

Victoria developed into a precocious toddler, happily playing with her two older brothers while exploring everything within reach. At age three, however, Victoria began to complain of chronic headaches. Her parents promptly sought help from the medical community, & the diagnosis was the stuff of every parent's nightmare: hydrocephalus, a dreadful condition where excess cerebrospinal fluid compresses the brain and causes all sorts of harmful side effects.

A Denver neurosurgeon implanted a state-of-the-art shunt to relieve the pressure, but its metal valve soon clogged, raising the possibility of another traumatic operation. Jack and Carol (neither of whom had medical training) asked the question "What if a shunt could be made out of soft material instead of metal? Could obstructions be crushed and flushed from the outside?" While some were skeptical about this novel idea, Jack and Carol forged ahead, and within ten years The Denver Shunt[®] had become a household name in neurosurgery, with an estimated 10,000 lives saved worldwide.

But this unplanned contribution to humanity was just the beginning of Victoria's impact. She went on to earn a degree at the University of Denver & become a teacher, which began a lifelong passion for education. In 1987, she married the love of her life, Chris Lierheimer, and together they founded Evergreen Academy, a K-8 school that educated hundreds of young students. When Chris tragically passed from cancer in 2010, Victoria faced the future with her signature boldness and strong Christian faith, once again setting an example for the world to see.

Of all her adventures in life, nothing pleased Victoria more than raising up four fine children alongside her husband, and she considered these years to be the best of her life. Once the children were on their way, Victoria returned to school and earned a Master's Degree in Criminology. Using her real estate savvy, she developed affordable first homes for young couples, reformed felons, & others trying to establish a new lease on life.

While Victoria's years may have been cut short, the impact of those years extends beyond what can be measured with an earthly calendar. She will be sorely missed, but Victoria remains with us in spirit, and would no doubt urge us all to have faith, to be kind, and — as she most surely did — to leave the place a little better than how we found it.


