Coronation will have happened in all its pomp and ceremony. What an historic and momentous occasion it will be for our nation, as we have not had a Coronation since 2ndJune 1953 when Queen Elizabeth II was crowned. It will be a time to reflect and celebrate all the good things in our country. At the centre of the celebration weekend will be a Christian service where His Majesty will be anointed as King.

What an amazing opportunity this will be to speak to children and young people in schools about what is happening. It also gives us a chance to tell them that Charles is an earthly king, and that it is so much more important to celebrate our heavenly king, the Lord Jesus.

Since the last newsletter we've had the privilege of returning to St Aldhelm's School to do a series of year 9 lessons on the afterlife, exploring what Christians believe about forgiveness that heaven is an undeserved gift for those who put their faith in Jesus. One of these lessons was especially great as 50 students were in focused silence as we explained about forgiveness. It wasn't what they were expecting!


We've also begun doing lessons again at Linwood School and these have been going really well. Such a range of needs and abilities but each class has been really up for getting to know us and asking some brilliant questions about what it means to be a Christian.

We've done more lessons at St Edward's with year 9s about "Who killed Jesus?". We've launched a brand new Big Questions lunch club at Bishop of Winchester School where 20 came to the first one! And we've visited Talbot Heath School with our drug awareness lesson with powerful stories of transformation from special guests from Teen Challenge Dorset.

And this is all in addition to the other lunch and after school clubs that have been running week-on-week and lots of 1-to-1 meetings with church leaders to review and renew partnerships. It's been a busy but very encouraging time!

In our last newsletter we shared with you a brand-new training resource to be piloted called **Live it! Tell it!** In partnership with Agapé UK this resource aims to help equip young people to grow in confidence in sharing their faith.

Our pilot event saw 10 young people and 4 youth leaders gather to explore 3 sessions: **God's Story, Your Story and Their Story.** Each session is filled with video input from local youth workers, discussions and activities to help unpack each section. Alongside this, each young person is given a journal to guide them through the course and record their notes.

It was so encouraging to see young people getting involved in each session, sharing their experiences, praying for each other and looking forward to sharing their faith with their friends.



Advance date for **PACE Sponsored Prayer Walk**After the success of this event last year, we are going to do it again on


Saturday 9 September 2023 from 10am-3pm
