What is Generation Citizen?

Generation Citizen is a secondary school programme that aims to ensure that every student receives an effective action civics education, providing them with the knowledge and skills necessary to participate in our democracy as active citizens. To achieve this, Generation Citizen's core programme partners college volunteers, called Democracy Coaches, with secondary school teachers to lead an action civics curriculum in which students identify a pressing local issue (e.g. public transport, mental health, community gang culture) and learn to make their voices heard by developing and executing an action plan to address it. Generation Citizen aims to revitalise our democracy by changing how civics is taught, encouraging a diverse set of young people to make their voices heard, and reframe our society's perception of the political

process – motivating and enabling young people to become life-long engaged citizens, capable of leading change on important issues and ensuring that government is responsive to the needs of all citizens.

Why it Matters

Citizens are often distrustful of their leadership and civically disengaged. In response to a citizenry that is tuned out, leaders make decisions that fail to respond to a diverse constituency, and a vicious cycle ensues, wherein citizens become even less motivated to get involved. This cycle of civic disengagement can be particularly pronounced among youth. Young people, while idealistic and seeking change in our society, do not see politics as the answer, and turn away from an increasingly dysfunctional government. In turn, our elected officials and institutions are not paying enough attention to young people.

The Background

While studying at Brown University, Co-founder Scott Warren recognised that Americans (especially youth) lacked the democratic spirit he had witnessed in parts of the developing world. Because citizens aren't making their voices heard, our government only responds to a small subset of the citizenry. He started Generation Citizen (GC) in his senior year to teach young people the skills to participate in our democracy.
