Dear Friends,

This will be the final edition of 'The Anchor'. The first edition was produced for Palm Sunday 2020 at the start of the first lockdown. Over the last 15 months, with breaks only for holidays, and when I required eye surgery, the Anchor has tried to provide weekly material for prayer and reflection.

At the time of writing, it seems that there will be a significant easing of the lockdown restrictions from July 19th, a date which coincides with the day of the Circuit Farewell Service which will mark the end of my five years here, and so it seems appropriate to make this edition of 'The Anchor' the last.

You will perhaps remember that the name 'Anchor' was intended to remind us of the two churches who receive the mailing, Aldershot (A) and North Camp (NC). We thought of a range of words containing these three letters before settling on 'Anchor' as a reminder of the words found in Hebrews 6 v 19, "We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul....." and I have been encouraged to hear from those receiving the mailing each week that they have found it to be a reminder of the anchor of our faith that we find in Jesus Christ.

This 'final edition' is different in that I want to introduce Gina and Philip to you as they take over the oversight of North Camp and Aldershot respectively. I asked each of them to write a short introduction to themselves and to provide a photograph to go alongside what they have written. I leave the Circuit knowing that you will be inspired by their leadership and safe in their care.

As many of you know, Joy and I are moving to a house provided for us by the Methodist Ministers Housing Society. It is on the northern outskirts of

Poole, not far from the road to Wimborne. We previously lived in Verwood, which is about 15 miles away from there for 11 years between 1990 and 2001 and so we will be moving to an area which is, to some extent, familiar to us.

In this final edition I want to thank my wife Joy, and also Kayleigh and Rachel from North Camp, who all helped produce 'The Anchor' each week by 'proof reading' and improving what I had written. Kayleigh deserves a special 'thank you' for thinking up the name 'Anchor'.

Clearly, the last 15 months have been really challenging for us all and, as I come towards retirement, I am very aware that the lockdown, combined with my eye surgery, has meant that I've not been able to do what I would have hoped to do in my final months in full time Ministry. I've not been able to visit people in their homes and we haven't been able to meet together as we might have done, but, during these unusual months, you have been much in my thoughts and prayers.

Having spent the previous 15 years away from Circuit ministry as a Chair of District and College Principal, I have valued the opportunity to be involved in local church life once again for my final appointment. Thank you all for the welcome and support that you have given Joy and myself throughout those five years. We pray that you will continue to trust in Jesus as a 'sure and steadfast anchor of the soul'.

The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it; for he has founded it on the seas and established it on the rivers. (Psalm 24 v 1-2)


Hymn (StF 340)

Bible Reading: Matthew 28 v 16-20

¹⁶ Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. ¹⁷ When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. ¹⁸ And Jesus came and said



to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. ¹⁹ Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Reflection

On the first Easter Day, Matthew tells us that the risen Jesus meets with the women as they run from the empty tomb, and instructs them to tell the disciples to go to Galilee where they too will meet him.

Our Gospel reading this week picks up Matthew's account at that point. The eleven disciples do what they have been asked to do. They travel to Galilee and there they encounter the risen Jesus for themselves. However, it is clear from Jesus' words, that their journey to Galilee is just the first of many journeys in which they will be involved. Through their travels, and through their preaching, the message that Jesus is alive will be proclaimed to 'all nations'.

Today, we follow in their footsteps. Like those first disciples, our first journey must be towards Jesus so that we can meet him for ourselves. Then, once again like those first disciples, we are invited to journey towards others with the message of Jesus' love for them.

For some people the call to "Go and make disciples of all nations" will take them far from home as they travel as missionaries to other parts of the world. For others, this same challenge will involve sharing their faith with those they work with, with those who live in their street and, perhaps most difficult of all, with those within their own families.

Our response to meeting with Jesus might take us around the globe, or it might take us across the street, but in both cases the task is the same – to share with others the message of God's love which is seen most clearly in Jesus and his death upon the cross. To share our faith with others can seem a real challenge – but, as we share with others how Jesus has changed our lives, we can find comfort, strength and encouragement in the words of Jesus who promises us, as he promised those first disciples, "I am with you always, to the end of the age".

Prayers of Intercession

This week let us pray especially:

- For opportunities to speak to others about Jesus and what Jesus means to us.
- For all who are anxious about what the future holds in a time of change.

Gracious God, we ask these prayers through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord and Saviour. Amen
