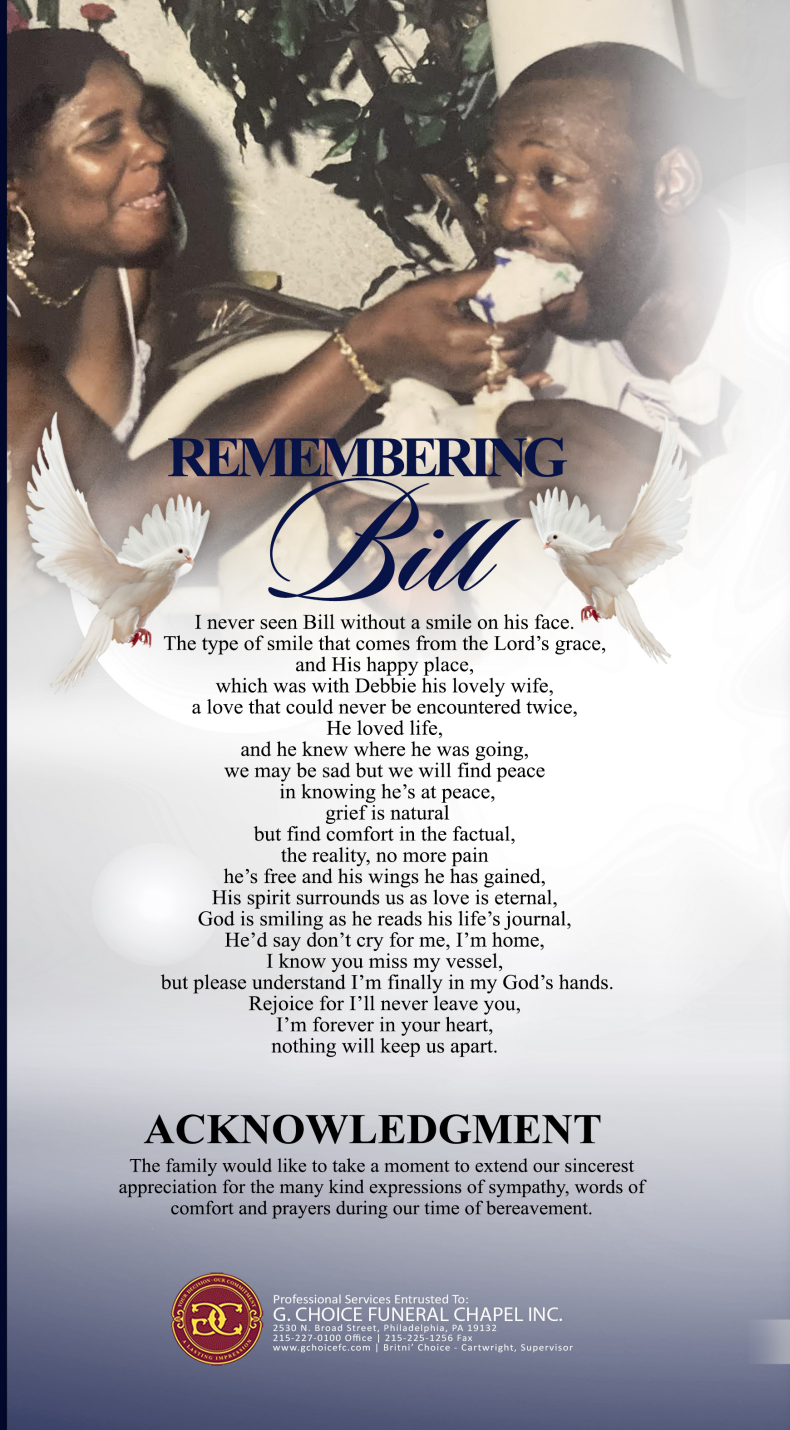

REMEMBERING *Bill*

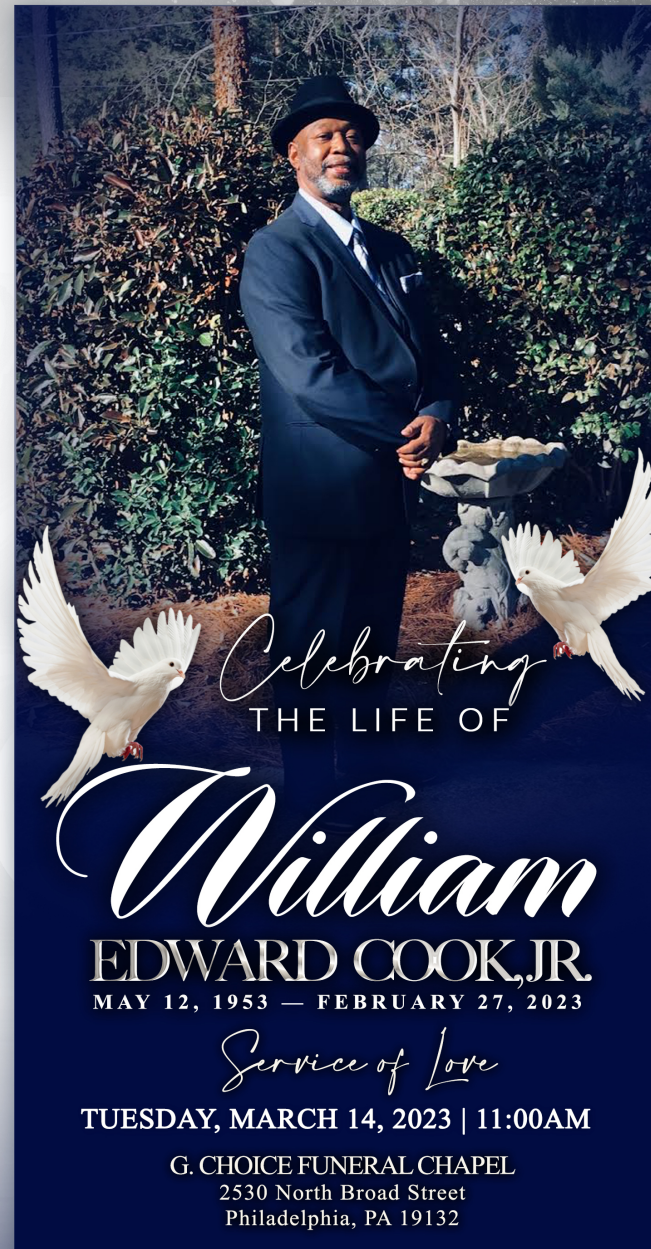
I never seen Bill without a smile on his face.
