

THE LIFE & LEGACY

J. Alphonso Dandy was born May 6, 1941 in Lake City, Florida to Alphonsa and Louise Dandy. He is the oldest of six children. He was educated in the public schools graduating from high school in Lake City, Florida. He graduated from Bethune Cookman College (now University) in 1962 with a B.S. degree in biology. While at Bethune Cookman College he became a member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. He joined the U.S. Air Force and served for 6 years as a cryptographic operator. After an honorable discharge from the Air Force, he moved to Miami, Florida and was employed by the University of Miami Medical School as a lab technician in birth defect research. After a year, he enrolled at Pennsylvania College of Optometry (PCO) in Philadelphia. He graduated from PCO in 1972 with a Doctor of Optometry degree. While in Philadelphia he met the love of his life, Evelyn.

Dr. Dandy and his family moved to Savannah where he practiced Optometry. He had the grand opening of his first office on November 1, 1972 and his first official day of his practice at his new office on Abercorn Street was November 3, 1972. He would later move his office to Waters Avenue. In addition to practicing optometry, he served as a consultant and contact lens investigator for Johnson and Johnson. In 1997 he was featured in Eyecare Business magazine as having one of the most successful Black-owned optical businesses in America. After 32 years of practice he retired in 2004. He then held the position of administrator of Antioch Medical Associates (a podiatry practice specializing in diabetic foot care). He also served as Chairman of the Board of Savannah Association for the blind, Inc as well as Interim Executive Director. In 2011 he was given the honor of having the SAB board room named after him.

Dr. Dandy was a dedicated member of Thankful Missionary Baptist Church where he was ordained as a deacon. He was a Sunday school teacher and member of the Trustees Ministry. He was a lifetime member of the NAACP and served on their Planning Committee that set the stage for events in the community.

In 2015 Dr. Dandy founded Dandy Youth Development (DYD) in effort to combat the negative statistics and low expectations promoted against black boys and men in America. Most recently Dr. Dandy published his first book, Blind Bloops chronicallying experiences that he had as he slowly lost his sight due his diagnosis of retinitis pigmentosa. Before his demise he finished his forthcoming book, God's Goodness from a Blind Man's Perspective.

Preceding him in death are his father, James Alphonso Dandy Sr., mother Louise Hart Dandy Allen, brothers, S. Algenon Dandy and Ricardo Dandy and sister Voncile Everette. His surviving siblings are Patricia Dandy and Linda Brown. He leaves to celebrate a life well-lived, his wife Evelyn Dandy, daughter Ronlyn and sons, Russell (Zorana) and Ronald (Regina), grandchildren, Zia, Russell Jr, Ronald Jr. and James Alphonso, Adalyn Grace, great grandson Brayden and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
