Well, of course, what I love about focus groups is it's not a test. Yay! There's no right or wrong answers so it's just tell us how you feel, your experiences and I'd expect that a few of us have different experiences so we would like you to share. If somebody has something that maybe you feel the same, or maybe you feel differently. Please share. It's my rule also to make sure that everybody speaks up. Um, and like because we're Latinos, it gets really good, and the conversation just gets blah. So, uh, just, if we could just speak one at a time because, uh, we are recording. And, uh, the reason we're recording, for one thing so I don't have to sit here and take notes so I can go back and watch the tapes and be able to listen, uh, closely to what everybody's saying. Um, but I tell you that so that we only speak one at a time and then also speak in a voice as loud as mine, so that it records. So, try not to- to speak over someone, and you don't have to wait for me to call on you. If you wanna say something, just go ahead and speak up. Um, and we wanna hear from everyone in tonight's groups.

Uh, my name is G1: R. I'm 29 years old. Born and raised here in Miami.

Mm-hmm (affirmative)
G1: R (00:07:00):
Um, I work at Verizon. I've been there for two years now, and I'm trying to go back to school, and try to
figure out what's next. 'Cause I don't wanna be there forever, so. (laughs)

Yeah, good. Well thank you, G1: R, for being here. And last but not least we have...

It's a lot of the AM, sometimes the AM.

Mm-hmm (affirmative). Is it-

G1: CG (00:12:18):

I've- I've heard the- the Latin AM but English, I guess I would say.

G1: CG (00:12:23):

But yeah, this, so this city... I mean, I've been here 30 years. I- I tell my wife it's just getting so... It- it's expensive as they would say oh, New York and California but we're- we're up there. You know, we're up there with the rents and all that. And I'm blessed to have a house that's paid for thanks to my parents but, uh... For any little inefficiency or whatever, it's like, costs like a couple of... It's like, incredible.

Personal observation is there's- there's huge media bias. From the left and the right, if you wanna call it that. And no matter what you see, I like to look at different things to get different perspectives. And it's so different what you see on this channel, what you don't hear about on this channel, but really happens, you know, elsewhere or you can hear about it on this. Uh, I try to... You know, if I'm... my political leanings are center right so I kinda lean that way but, you know, you also gotta look at the other side. Um, I just think people that follow one or look at the other, they just kinda get on a single track and...

from?
G1: NV (00:14:08):
I see a lot on like Instagram.
Moderator (00:14:08):
Okay. On Instagram.
G1: NV (00:14:08):
Twitter, social medias.
Moderator (00:14:10):
You're getting that on your phone?
G1: NV (00:14:11):
Yeah.
Moderator (00:14:11):
Okay. So you get Instagram. I'm sorry you said...
G1: NV (00:14:14):
Twitter.
Moderator (00:14:15):
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Twitter. Uh-huh (affirmative)

G1: NV (00:14:15):

Sometimes Facebook, too.

Moderator (00:14:17):

Uh-huh (affirmative). Do you follow news organizations on Twitter or do you, or politicians?

G1: NV (00:14:21):

Well, with how Instagram and Twitter and everything works, I'm sure you know, you just get everything now. You don't even have to be following them, they just show up on your feed. [crosstalk 00:14:30] Yeah. The algorithm.

Moderator (00:14:29):

Mm-hmm (affirmative)

G1: NV (00:14:35):

I don't like watching the news 'cause you never know what's true or not. And like, there's just so much bad stuff that I just don't wanna know sometimes. I don't wanna see it. But I'm bound to see it on social media or just hear about it anywhere.

Moderator (00:14:50):

Mm-hmm (affirmative). Well, what kinda news do you get from your smartphone versus your television?

G1: R (00:14:54):

It depends, um... I would say it's like, it could be the same like depending on what you... It goes back to what she said. Like even though she might not watch it, I mean, somehow it appears, you know, on social media.

Mm-hmm (affirmative)

G1: R (00:15:09):

Like, if you search something up, you know, like a specific topic like on the news or whatever, it's gonna pop up eventually, you know, like different types of outlets and, uh, stations...

Moderator (00:15:20):

So what kinds of topics are popping up on Instagram? What are you seeing on Instagram? G1: NV?

G1: NV (00:15:26):

Everything. Like all the shootings, all the- the cases with like all the rappers, all the actors... The weather... I get everything and then I think the internet you just get more views, different point of views and stuff and I don't think, maybe the TV doesn't cover as broadly.

Mm-hmm (affirmative). Now, when y'all are, um... For those who- who also kinda get the news from Instagram and Facebook and these other social media stuff. Are you guys reposting or liking or engaging in the posts in any way? Or is it just coming across your feed?

G1: R (00:16:04):

Only if it's positive, honestly.

Moderator (00:16:06):

You only do positive? And- and G1: D, you- you're saying you do?

G1: D (00:16:10):

I do, um, forward it. Especially, uh, I have a background. I used to be a police and fire dispatcher and when I follow a lot of, a lot of, you know, police departments and, um... So it's kinda scary sometimes. There's a lot of things that I like sharing with people. Um, things that they don't hear of sometimes like a lot of police posts, also. But it's kinda scary at the same time because just in people sometimes knowing where my background is, um, I've had people like unfriend me or, you know, um, sometimes I get... I got backlash once because, um, remember when the Cubans, um, were trying to block the- the expressways?

I trust Elon Musk.

Elon Musk? Okay.

I think he's pretty truthful.

Twitter to spread his news, I guess so.

But what I'm talking about is news sources. So-

So where do you get your news from then? The newspaper?

So, I read those and then I also get a lot of emails. I'm signed up to a lot of subscriptions.

Mm-hmm (affirmative). And so that's how you get your-
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G1: CC (00:18:06):

Yeah. Throughout the years, I signed up to a lot of military magazines and they send me [inaudible 00:18:10]

Moderator (00:18:10):

And you trust Twitter on the news feed stuff? Is that, do you feel confident about it?

G1: CC (00:18:12):

Uh, maybe the new Twitter. Maybe the new one.

Moderator (00:18:18):

The new one? Okay. All right. Um, J, what about you? Where do you get your... You know, what- what media sources do you trust the most? Do you trust television...

G1: J (00:18:26):

Sometimes I watch television but it depends 'cause sometimes I listen to independent journalism, uh, journalists, excuse me. And other ones, uh, I watch sometimes Fox. I don't agree with them all the time. Sometimes CNN. And, uh, and sometimes when it comes to national things, sometimes I don't even listen to just to US, Australia. Like I think it's Skyline, and sometimes Al-Jazeera because sometimes the point of view is not the same here in the US. And- and- and I try to filter. I try to filter, I mean, what I'm listening to.

Do you trust the network news or the cable news better? So when I say network news, I mean like ABC, NBC, CBS.

It's become already a digital platform, you know, uh- uh... But what I don't like is when news become opinionated, from the left or the right. You know, so journalism... I- I haven't studied journalism but it's so different. Like you bringing up the 70s, journalism before was more, uh-

G1: J (00:19:21):

... more facts. Like, there's sometimes I don't even listen to Telemundo except locally here América TV. Sometimes, you know, the issues they bring on, you know, within Latinos is not the same. There's an agenda, obviously. I'm like, okay, you know, and- and- and [inaudible 00:19:34] like she brought up the, uh, the- the blockage. Of when they had the- the Black Lives Matter movement, here was brought up. A journalism from Univision mentioned Puerto Ricans when, 'cause they had a vandalized, uh, Bayside. I'm like seriously, they should've fired them. I- I complained to Univision for that journalist. It was locally here. How are you going to generalize? Where did you get this guy? You know, Puerto Ricans, are you kidding me? And that- that upset Puerto Ricans here. And I'm like, I- I couldn't believe it. I'm like you're-... Where did they get this? Puerto Ricans? There's all types of ethnic groups who are vandalism downtown and he brings up. So, that was a little upsetting and more upsetting than when Univision has

that one, you know, uh, reporter there still. I think he should've been penalized for what he did. That was wrong 'cause that- that could upset. You know, you can't go generalizing a particular group.


