

Life's Journey MACEO HENRY BRODNAX, JR.

"Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

The light of Maceo Henry Brodnax, Jr. began to shine, when he blessed his parents, Maceo Henry Brodnax, Sr. and Lucille Brown Brodnax with his birth on June 22, 1930, in Kansas City, Missouri. He was the second child born in the family. He was raised surrounded by the love of his sister, Doris. As a child, he enjoyed swimming at the Glenarm, the 20th Street Recreation Center and the Curtis Park Pool. He was given the nickname "Sonny Boy" when he was younger. He also enjoyed playing football, basketball, and baseball.

Maceo received his formal education by first attending Whittier Elementary School, in Denver, Colorado, where Marie L. Anderson-Greenwood was his first-grade teacher. He graduated from Manual High School in 1948. He furthered his education by attending the University of Denver where he earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Education in 1952. He continued his education and earned a master's degree in Counseling/Guidance from the University of Denver in 1957.

He received post graduate studies from the University of Colorado and Adams State College. He was an Assistant Coach in football and a Head Coach in baseball at Manual High School. He later became the first black official in Colorado to work at a high school level and the first to work at state level tournaments. He became an Educator, Coach, and Mentor to many young people during his illustrious career. He primarily worked in the Denver Public Schools, but he maintained secondary endeavors which allowed him to continue encouraging youth. Throughout his career, he was admired for his strength, tenacity, humility, and his ability to inspire others. He often said, "I always felt I could do anything as well as anyone else."

Maceo first wed, Laverne Brodnax in Denver, Colorado. To this union, Frank, Mitzi, and Marc were born. On June 24, 1989, he married, Donna Baird. They exchanged vows at Macedonia Baptist Church. With this union, he became the father of Christopher. The couple enjoyed traveling, dining in new restaurants, and spending quality time with family and friends. Marc remembers his dad as always attending his football games. Mitzi remembers her dad as always available when needed and picking her up from school. Chris remembers his dad as encouraging and being present during sports and other school activities. He was later blessed with five grandchildren, Kourtney, Christian, Langston, Ophelia, and Solomon, who all were an additional source of joy and pride in his life. They lovingly called him "Pop-Pop" and "Pop-Pop Maceo." Kourtney fondly remembers making fresh fruit smoothies when "Pop-Pop" would visit. She made sure his smoothie was extra special with toppings and served in her favorite glass. They then would sit and watch Sports Center and talk about his days as a referee.


A man of faith and belief in the Lord, Maceo was a longtime member of Macedonia Baptist Church. He believed in the power of prayer and having the right relationship with the Lord. He served his church and the Lord as a member of the Educational Resource Committee. At the time of his passing, he had been a member for over thirty-three years.

Some of Maceo's civic and community activities include being Activity Director for the Metropolitan State College where he implemented the National Youth Sports Program for the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He was a noted member of the University of Denver Pioneers All-Time Roster. He was inducted in the Colorado High School Activities Association Hall of Fame. He was awarded the Unsung Hero Award by former Denver Mayor Wellington Webb. He has served as a Century Team member of Manual High School. Maceo was a proud member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., with 72 years of achievement. He was a charter member of their Beta Theta Chapter. He was also a charter member of the Colorado Black Round Table, where he earned recognition as a Champion of Education.

Maceo was a fun-loving man, who enjoyed life and those he encircled. In his free time, he enjoyed reading the newspaper, watching baseball, football, and basketball games on television. He also enjoyed western movies, and Family Feud. He will be missed by all who were fortunate enough to have known this kind and giving man, who freely gave his time, talents, and wisdom to all. To know Maceo was to love him.

He is preceded in death by son, Maceo Frank Brodnax; and a sister, Doris Calloway.

Maceo Henry Brodnax, Jr., departed this life to the embrace of the Lord on June 13, 2022, in Aurora, Colorado.
