Tears will flow and I do hope you will miss me for a short time. Don't demand to know why, as God's ways are not our ways. Carry on, as life must go on.


I hope that my spirit will linger among you, and that I may have made a difference to you for the goodness and glory to God. Remember, the line between life and death is so very thin.



Art's life designed by God was on His drawing board for a purpose and in Job 14:5, we read "a person's days are determined; you have decreed the number of his months and have set limits he cannot exceed". The length of life isn't what's important. It's that God had his hand of control on that life.

On November 3, 2023, at approximately 6:37 PM, surrounded by family at home, our almighty God opened His arms and welcomed Art into his Heavenly home.

Art's wishes were that his body be donated to science, hoping to help someone in the future to overcome some of the issues that he had faced through life.

He was preceded in death by his mother and father; son, Daniel Thayne; daughter, Tasha Dawn; and granddaughter, Effie Grace Trout.
