
Reflections from the Rector (designate)...



I write this at the beginning of the Church of England's Generosity Week' which marks a time for giving thanks to God and for the Church to consider their financial giving in response to God's call for us to give generously, sacrificially and joyfully.

The church teaching last week (24th September) and for much of October will largely focus on the generous nature of God.

Two of the most generous people I know, died quite recently. One was a new congregation member at St Antony's, Angela Dunn. The other was my dear mother. Their generous spirit and actions always inspire me to be generous whenever I remember them.



The Church's calendar is put together such that the call to remembrance follows the teaching on generosity and thanksgiving. This year, the first Sunday in November is All Saints Day and marks the beginning of the busiest season in the church's

calendar, which culminates with the Christmas services. On All Saints Day, we also commemorate the Faithful Departed. All Saints Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints who knew well the struggles of human living.

The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed celebrates the saints, those whom we love and see no more, who have gone before us. We remember them in a more intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

One of these services (All Saints Day @9.30am) will have mostly church congregation members attending. The other (Memorial Service @3pm) will have friends and family of those who have had funerals and Internment of Ashes for loved ones over the past year.

This is one service in which the church reaches out to those who mourn, where God's life giving mercy, comfort and peace is expressed in the liturgy of All Soul's Day. We send out letters to invite those families to church, many of whom would not normally enter a church to worship. Welcome and hospitality is offered to encourage visitors to feel comfortable and at home.

There is some work for us to be done in finding out how best to encourage the unchurched to come to church and become part of the church family.

But there is no disputing that services of remembrance, including Remembrance Sunday in November, do draw in those who are not regular church goers, as do the Christmas services.



There's something about these services which speaks into their lives, comforts and gives them hope for the future. These are also times when people tend to want to be more

respectful, kind, gentle, peaceful, generous and showing goodwill towards others.

My prayer is that the church family at All Saints and St Antony's will resolve 'to put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony.'

Home Communion Pastoral Team

On Sunday 17th September, nine congregation members were Affirmed and blessed as they committed themselves to serving God in Home Communion Pastoral Ministry.

This is a ministry of visiting the Sick and Housebound on behalf of All Saints and St Antony's churches in the Parish of Sanderstead, offering a Service of Holy Communion with Scripture reading and prayers as well as administering the already consecrated Sacrament. The new administrants have either received hands-on training or will receive training, by accompanying Revd Carol on Home Communion Visits and will continue in this ministry under the direct supervision of Revd Carol Bates, Incumbent.



There are an increasing number of faithful parishioners who have attended All Saints, St Antony's and St Edmund's (the previous churches within the Sanderstead Team Ministry). However over the years, due to sickness, old age and other infirmities, they are unable to travel into a church building for a Sunday morning service.

The Canons of the Church of England allow for the distribution of already consecrated bread and wine to people in this situation. The task may be performed by any Priest, Deacon or Reader licensed to the parish. It may also be performed by those laity who have been given permission by the Bishop to distribute the Sacrament in their parish.

Sylvia Smith, Lyn Davison, Kevin Wright, Ann Turner, Tom Griffiths, Rosemary Kempsell, Sue Wragg, Richard Wragg and Libby Eldridge have all been approved by Bishop Rosemarie to serve the wider community in this way, under the direct supervision of the Parish Priest. Please continue to keep the Home Communion Pastoral Team in your prayers as we begin this ministry together across the parish and wider community.

The butterfly effect.....

Some years ago my family gave me a butterfly kit. This involved me sending away for my caterpillars in March and waiting for them to arrive. When they came in their special container I thought at first the 5 minuscule 4mm insects I had ben sent were dead.

However once settled in, I could almost watch them grow before my eye. Within a week or so they were about 4cm, black and hairy and within 10 days, they had climbed to the top of their tub and attached themselves to the paper disc under the lid and turned themselves into a chrysalis.


They are very vulnerable at this stage so I had to carefully transfer them whilst pinning the paper disc to a pop up net that came with the original kit.

The next stage for them to change into a butterfly, took another 10 days, however you could see slight changes that were taking place in the pattern and colours through the chrysalis shell.

To see the wonderful and somewhat emotional moment when they emerged as a butterfly is truly breathtaking, but as instructed after giving them a drink of some homemade nectar, I released them to complete their life cycle.

The timing for us may be different, but like the caterpillar and chrysalis, we start off as something rather unremarkable and then as we feed on God's word, we begin to change from inside.

It takes time and patience as we go through the various stages and we are vulnerable to outside influences. However when we are ready we will emerge like the butterfly, changed from the inside out and be a continuing part of the miracle of God's creation, ready to fulfil our purpose in his kingdom.

CONFIRMATION CLASSES.

There are 3, possibly 4 people from All Saints who are interested in being Confirmed. Confirmation is a second opportunity for us to commit ourselves and our lives to God after baptism, and is normally celebrated within the Eucharist.

Unlike most Baptisms where, quite often the candidates are too young to understand the questions answered for them by parents and God-parents, those who come for Confirmation answer questions about their faith for themselves.

Confirmation is administered by a Bishop, who speaks for the larger church community to which candidates are being called to belong.





The structure of the Confirmation classes follow the Eucharist Service:

Week 1 : Gathering & Confession Week 2 : The Word of God : The Bible and The Creed Week 3 : Prayer Week 4: Holy Communion & Blessing for Dismissal (sending out / Mission of God)

The first of the Confirmation classes was held at the end of July. The following 3 sessions will be held in October and will be followed by the Confirmation service, at St Mary's Sanderstead on Sunday October 29th at 5pm.





The 16th Purley (7th Sanderstead All Saints) Scout Group has been going for 86 years and is made up of one Scout Troop, one Cub pack and one Beaver colony. Parish Away-day Summary - part 1

The vision process started with a couple of Bible readings taken from Corinthians chapter 12: 12-26 and John chapter 12: 34-35. Respectively about the body of Christ, with each part serving a different function without envy or spite and in its proper place; the latter about loving one another so that all would know we are disciples of Christ. These were important to have as fundamental Christian values whilst trying to envision the future. We also had a time of worship led by the band from St Antony's which got the day off to a good start.



We then listened to a presentation by Jo Gavin, the Children and Young People's worker/ Mission Action Planner for the diocese Southwark. This talk focused on the churches commitment to be Younger, Humbler, and more diverse. She said it was important for the church to reach a shared vision and work together, especially now there are now two congregations in the parish. Once a vision could be reached, then we could begin to think about priorities. She stressed the importance of looking outwards not backwards, and that our priorities should fall within the 5 marks of mission:

- Tell proclaim the good news,
- Teach nurture faith
- · Tend respond to human needs with loving service
- Transform seek to change and challenge unjust structures in society
- Treasure strive to safeguard creation and sustain the earth.




Breaking into groups of about 6-8 people, we were presented with a map of the parish and asked to think outside of church, identifying the places where people are meeting/ congregating in the parish. This generated a whole list of parks, restaurants, coffee shops, schools, care homes and other places that the church could consider reaching out to in the wider community. Mission is about going out to people.





Parish Away-day Summary - part 2



After some refreshments, we then had the opportunity to reflect on our own personal gifts and callings and share ideas on :

- 1)Fruits of what we are already doing in terms of mission.
- 2)Opportunities for mission.
- 3)Obstacles and challenges to mission.

We then broke into our small groups and were asked to agree on 3 words that we felt described the church's Vision. Following on from this, we were to agree on 3 main priorities for the church to work on over the next 2-3 years.

All the information shared from the day would be taken by Jo and Revd Carol to distil the common themes for mission that were being presented.Options for a Vision statement based on some of the words and comments from the day would be put together by Mike Fixter.

Church Warden would also assist this process. The final Vision Statement and priorities would be taken to the PCC to be agreed.

Once agreed, working groups would be set up to agree on some specific, measurable, achievable and realistic targets for each priority area, that the church can focus on achieving over the next 2-3yrs.

Key topics discussed included:

- Julie Marsh has been appointed as a Safeguarding Officer and is currently undertaking the necessary training
- · Bishop Rosemarie has visited St Antony's and is pleased with progress
- The disabled toilet is due to be replaced with one at the correct height
- Barbara Webster-Dudley has been affirmed as "Doorkeeper of St Antony's" keeping an eye on the building and those using it, locking up and making sure that the services run smoothly
- St Antony's has been registered as a Place of Welcome and will launch a drop in facility on Weds 11th October. It will be open every week from 11.00 3.00. For the months of December, January and February it will also serve as a Warm Hub with support from the local Rotary Club.
- The draft Job Description far the Pioneer Minister has finally been received and sundry suggestions were made. It will be further updated after the forthcoming Awayday
- A summary of the questionnaires relating to the Awayday was reviewed and would be available on the day
- The recent Children's Holiday Club was very successful and would be followed by sessions for local schoolchildren depicting the Christmas Story. Volunteers are still sought to start a Sunday School at All Saints, initially once a month
- Richard &B Sue Wragg will be appointed as Eucharistic Ministers
- The Treasurer reported that we made a small deficit in the fist 8 months of the year, but it was nevertheless agreed to increase our contribution to the Parish Support fund for 2024, slightly above the cost of providing a full stipendiary minister. The Pledge 2024 documentation was reviewed and approved
- Quinquennial reports had been received for both All Saints an St Antony's. The most urgent items would be addressed this year with category two matters actioned in 2024
- A deep clean for the All Saints Halls was agreed, to be undertaken at some pointafter the Pantomime.


