



In high school, she was active in cheerleading, learning to become a homemaker, and met her lifetime sweetheart, Galland. They married while he was on leave from the Army, September 1, 1953.

Della and Galland finished his Army career together in Louisiana, and moved back to Windom to farm. Their first home was a little place across the road from where they lived their final years. It had no indoor plumbing. She had 3 babies there, and hosted many family gatherings. They moved from that place in 1963, to the "big house" on the highway. It must have been an incredible relief to have more room and indoor plumbing. Della enjoyed cooking, baking, sewing, and gardening. All of those done while singing. She loved to sing. She loved hymns but also the old cowboy songs. She serenaded the nursing home frequently, with all these songs still in her mind. She was a farmer's wife, and bravely complied with all that meant. Meals brought to the field, gate opener and closer, calf feeder and doctor. She raised chickens for eggs, and to butcher. Helped move equipment. Plus, all the other duties as mother, cook, seamstress, taxi, and teacher. Della was an accomplished artist and her children and grandchildren are thankful recipients of her talent. All of her children, grandchildren, and greatgrandchildren loved Grandma's bread. She

faithfully made homemade bread every Saturday for decades. One pan of rolls for church potluck, 2-loaf pans for toast at home...decades...every week. Yum! She hosted many family get togethers at that big house on the highway, creating cherished memories for all. While short of stature, she could stand off a 2,000 lb. bull with a sunflower stalk. She was not afraid to do what needed to be done.

Della loved her family. She especially loved children, and delighted in her grandchildren, and later her great-grandchildren. She loved her church family and frequently checked up on people. She loved her Kenny Graham. While Galland might occasionally question Kenny's lessons, Della had them recorded and played them over and over. She was Kenny's number one fan and cheerleader. Church was always the highlight of her week. Della loved people.

The loss of her first born child, Mike, was a devastating life event, but her faith remained strong and grew deeper. She longed to see her Savior face to face, and to see her own son again. She studied the Bible all her adult life, and was a wonderful example of the Proverbs 31 woman. What a legacy for us all.
