JULIUS VETTER, 82, Bismarck, passed away on October 30, 2024.

Julius was born on the family farm in rural Linton on September 20, 1942. Farming, cattle, and horses were his life. His time spent on the family farm instilled in him a strong work ethic.

Julius and Carol Wangler were married at St. Boniface in 1963. Together, they lovingly raised five kids: Kevin, Karla, Melody, Kleo and Scott.
