Mother Eugenia (Tean) Prink

Eugenia Frink, born on May 9, 1931 in Whitesville, North Carolina, lived a life marked by resilience, faith, and a deep love for God, her family and community. Eugenia worked alongside her parents on the farm, developing skills and a work ethic that would serve her throughout her life. She found joy and solace in gardening, a passion that she nurtured all her life.

Raised in a devout Christian home, with her father serving as a deacon and her mother as a church mother, Eugenia's early years were steeped in faith. This foundation of spirituality would guide her throughout her life, leading her to dedicate herself to a life of service and unwavering faith in Christ.

With dreams of becoming a wife, mother, and experiencing the vibrancy of city life, Eugenia completed her education and moved north. She and her husband, George William (who preceded her in death), settled in Jersey City, New Jersey, as part of the Great Migration. There, they raised their four children: Willie Sr., Sylvester, Peggy, and Ernestine.

Eugenia's faith led her to Heavenly Temple COGIC, where she found her spiritual home under the leadership of the late Bishop John and Mother Fannie Knight, and later Bishop Kevin Knight. Living by the creed "whatever your hands find to do, do it," Eugenia served the church in numerous roles for 45 years, including President of Hospitality, member of the Mother's Board, Usher's Board, Bible Band teacher, Missionary Board, and leader of the Noonday Prayer Warrior Ministry, among others. Her homemade soups were renowned for their healing powers, and she extended her ministry to the wider community through initiatives like the Feed Seniors Outreach. In Jersey City, Eugenia also worked as an aide at Christ Memorial Hospital for 32 years, demonstrating her commitment to caring for others. She was an avid reader, with a vast collection of books that kept her informed and enlightened on various topics. A trailblazer in her own right, Eugenia became a shrewd businesswoman, owning and managing a three-family home, a remarkable achievement for her time. She often shared her wisdom, saying, "It's not how much money you make but what you do with it, and a good name will take you far in life."

After retiring, Eugenia moved to Savannah, Georgia, with her daughter Peggy, where they built a new home together. She joined New Life Christian Ministries, under the leadership of her son, Pastor Willie & Co-Pastor Roslyn Frink. Eugenia was immensely proud of her son and cherished the prophecy given at his birth that he would become a pastor. She continued her ministry work in Savannah, becoming a mother figure to all she met and remaining active in the Ministry of Helps and Outreach ministries. Her home in Savannah became a haven for fellowship, with homemade Sunday dinners and her famed healing soups.

Eugenia Frink's life was a testament to her great faith and determination. She lived out her God-given destiny with grace and strength, embodying the virtues of the Proverbs 31 woman: "Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." She instilled these principles in her children and family, leaving behind a legacy of love, faith, and service and her life will be remembered as a shining example of faith and perseverance.

Mother Frink was preceded in death by her parents, her husband George William, her brothers Russell Campbell and Billy Ray Shirden, her sister Juanita (Ed) Lennon, grandson Sylvester Jr. and Son In-law Ernest Dorsey.

Left to cherish her memory are her four children: Pastor Willie (Roslyn) Frink, Sylvester (Linda) Frink, Peggy Frink-Dorsey, and Ernestine (Richard) Fondoe. She is also survived by her brother, Pastor John (Shirley) Shirden, and her two sisters, Linda (Weldon) McKenzie and Eva (James) Thompson. Additionally, she leaves behind ten grandchildren: Willie Jr., Ivy, LaTonya, Roxanne, Jamar, LaToya, Thomas, Marcus, Brandon, and Deonate; six great-grandchildren; two great-great-grandchildren; and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, and other supportive and loving friends.
