

Two of Sheri's greatest joys and accomplishments were her daughters, Jamie and Jessica. She just beamed at her girls and enjoyed doing everything a mother and daughter do. She was their biggest fan in everything they did. There were many trips to Nebraska to visit her mother and her brother, Bobby, and trips to Phoenix to see her brother, Lonnie. She took her girls on a surprise trip to Disney Land while in Phoenix for her niece's graduation. She loved taking her girls to new places.

Once Sheri became a grandmother, the girls were put on the back burner because those grandkids were spoiled rotten! In the summers, you could find her on the ball fields supporting Dezirae in all her softball adventures. She knew every play, every call, and was the loudest and usually the most embarrassing person in the bleachers. During her life, Sheri enjoyed bookkeeping, which she did for many people throughout the years. She was also a member of Thursday night bowling league for many years. One of her favorite things though was playing dominoes, dice and cards, usually Skip-Bo, the old version. She would play cards for hours with friends and family. There was no cheating with her, and she usually won. In the last few years, she has really enjoyed going out for breakfast. She would call everyone she knew until she found someone to go with her. She would call friends, her daughters, and her grandchildren. If you did not answer the first call, she would call right back.
