

#### CELEBRATING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF RUTH MARIE HARDEN



Ruth Marie Harden was born to Viola and Isom Reese, Sr. in Bastrop, Texas (Sayers) on February 4, 1940. Ruth attended school in the Sayers community through the 8th grade and beginning in the ninth grade, she attended Emile High School. While in high school Ruth took homemaking classes (setting up her love for sewing) and was a member of both the track and basketball teams. Ruth graduated from high school in 1957 as the Salutatorian of her graduating class of six students.

Ruth accepted Christ at an early age and was baptized at the Pleasant Hill Missionary Baptist Church (MBC) under Pastor S.M. Metters. She served as a faithful member all her life and was passionate about her role as an usher. While at Pleasant Hill MBC she served as the Usher President for over 50 years and was active in the St. John's District Baptist Association (Dale Subdistrict). Ruth was an "old school" usher and made sure everyone

understood the appropriate things to "do", and "not do" while in church. She stressed no moving during prayer or while the Pastor was speaking, passing through the pulpit, chewing gum, and engaging in anything that wasn't part of the church program. Ruth also took pride in seeing her family and friends at

the Usher's Annual and Family and Friends Day program. She made sure to invite family far and wide since she wanted their presence at church on these special days. She also attended church every Sunday and was a faithful Sunday School attendee. Prior to his passing, she was taken to church by her husband "Moze", and following his death, her nieces ensured she made it to church every Sunday.

After high school, Ruth moved to Austin in 1960 where she shared her first apartment with her cousin Ella Wilson. While she lived in Austin she worked as a Dormitory Keeper at the University of Texas at Austin in the women's dormitories. Later in life she worked at Winn's Store and the cafeteria at Ortega Elementary in Austin, Texas. Ruth further developed her love and craft for sewing by making clothes for family, friends, and customers. She was such an avid seamstress that she often made clothing, hats, and other items with no pattern to guide her. She was truly a clothing designer that was ahead of her time.

Anyone that knew Ruth also knew that she was a wonderful baker. She baked pound cakes, pecan pies, and most notably tea cakes like no one else. There wasn't a friend or family member that wouldn't ask for tea cakes immediately upon coming into her presence. When she blessed you with tea cakes, you knew you were special to her. She also loved to plant vegetables in her garden at the farm, and barbecue for the family. But, until a few years ago we always thought that Dad/Pops was barbecuing these delicious meats — until she finally told us she was the pitmaster and he was merely tending the fire.

Ruth married Mozel Harden and to this union three sons were born – Artie, Eric, and Andrew. Her sons were her pride and joy and she always referred to them as her "boys". Although Ruth was called home to be with her Lord and Savior on Tuesday, February 6, 2024, in Austin, Texas, she was able to live back on the farm with her beloved husband and near her birthplace in the Sayers community the last five years of her life. Ruth leaves to cherish her memories and legacy, her sons Eric (Cheryl) Harden of Cedar Creek, Texas, and Andrew (Sherrie) Harden of Buda, Texas, her sister Viola Faye Goodman of Bastrop, Texas; twelve grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends.

She was preceded in death by her son Artie Baxter Harden; husband Mozell Harden; parents Isom and Viola Reese; brothers Isom Jr. (Man), Ruben (Pie), Earlie, Sam, Earnest, and Woodie; sisters Mary Lou Benford, Dovie Washington, Narcissus (Shug) Canada, Omega Harden, Ida Mae (Big Baby) Dove, and Ivory Mae (Tina) Flowers.


