Cotton Candy

Thank you to all who came out to our APCS/MPA Fall Festival. We had a great time! A big hit this year was the 7&8th grade cotton candy booth. A huge thank you to Victoria and the Radchishins for sharing their machine and their hard work. Also a big thank you to Grace for making the amazing cones of candy for us.

Cotton candy wasn't always kids' stuff. In the 5th century a form of spun sugar was served at banquet tables of the European aristocracy in a time when sugar was so rare that it was kept under lock and key.

The sweet, sugary treat we recognize was **invented** by a dentist! In 1904, dentist William Morrison and confectioner John C. Wharton made a dessert that contained less sugar than other carnival treats like **candy** apples and funnel cakes. They called it "fairy floss," and sold it at the St. Louis World's Fair. It was a huge success selling 68,655 boxes at 25¢ (equivalent to \$6.97 in 2018) per box. *

Today the candy is made by heating and liquefying sugar, spinning it centrifugally through minute holes — and finally allowing the sugar to rapidly cool and re-solidify into fine strands that resemble cotton. Nutritionally speaking, the sugars in cotton candy are simple carbohydrates, so they supply your body nothing but calories.

Psalms 19:10-12 tell us that *"God's words are perfect. Sweeter than cotton candy, but good for us. They will bring strength and are full of life."* EMT©
