

A Celebration of Life Doug Leach

Don Douglas "Doug" Leach, 75, of McPherson, KS, peacefully passed away on Sunday, May 19, 2024, surrounded by family at McPherson Hospital.

Doug was born on April 5, 1949, in McPherson, KS, the son of Don Carlos and Doris Jean (Crumpacker) Leach. He graduated from McPherson High School in 1967 and attended McPherson College. On August 25, 1967, Doug was united in marriage to Anita Joy Osborn at the Windom United Methodist Church.

Doug was a leadman at North American Pipe and CertainTeed, retiring after 43 years. He also served 24 years in the Kansas National Guard.

He attended New Hope Evangelical Church.

When we were first married, Doug went to McPherson College and worked nights at CertainTeed Products. We lived in the college courts. We enjoyed meeting with other college courters and played cards about every weekend. We also drank coke out of bottles back then, and we saved the bottles and cashed them in for money to go to the movies.

Doug loved to go camp out and fish. Friday night after work, we would load up some food in the camper and head out to the lake. Sometimes it would be dark when we got there. Sometimes we'd end up in the boonies, set up a campfire, and we were in Heaven. There are plenty of stories that could be told. One time, we were camped on a hill on the south shore of Kanopolis, our '66 Chevy pickup decided to take off on its own. It rolled down the hill, over the cliff and landed on its nose then sat down on all four wheels. Doug and the boys watched it in slow motion as it hit the shore. We drove the truck home the next day. Strong and sturdy, they don't make them like that anymore.

Doug loved hunting with his brother Dale and our boys. We ate plenty of game meat in our early years. He enjoyed watching his grandchildren in sports, and continued to support the Bullpup basketball teams.
