The two were united in marriage on October 14, 1947 at St. Placidus Catholic Church in Mott. Following their marriage, Maggie and Fred moved to the Kuntz homestead south of Dickinson where they raised their family. To this union, nine children were born: Josephine, Edward, Donna Mae, Thomas, Timothy, Lawrence, Linda, Eugene, and Robert. After Fred passed in 1987, Maggie was very proud of getting her driver’s license. In August of 1993, Maggie moved to Dickinson. She moved to Benedict Court and St. Benedict’s Health Center in October of 2016, where she stayed until her passing. Maggie was a member of the Leap Year Homemakers, Christian Mothers, St. Ann’s Auxiliary, Catholic Daughters, St. Joseph’s Hospital Auxiliary, St. Patrick’s Catholic Church, and St. Pius Verein. She volunteered her time at St. Joseph’s Hospital in the OR waiting room, the Trinity Mardi Gras, and as a clerk for Range 96 elections for twenty years. Her faith was very important to her and she was a dedicated prayer warrior at Eucharistic Adoration for many years. Maggie loved to travel, and one of her highlights was going to Rome. Maggie was a great cook, and would have food for any visitors that stopped by. Everyone was always welcomed at Maggie’s table. A few of her specialties were sour cream twists, German potato salad, chokecherry jelly, pickles, and caramel rolls. Maggie loved Christmas, particularly decorating for it and baking Christmas cookies. She would also prepare all the large dinners for family holidays, not just Christmas. Maggie was a devoted mother and grandmother. She made baby blankets for each grandchild. Her best times were spent with family

and she will be greatly missed.
