DOROTHYANN KING was born on December 1, 1947, in Omaha, Georgia to the late Charity Jackson Rivers. She was educated in the public school system of Stewart County and graduated from Lumpkin High school. A year after graduating high school she joined the United States Job Corps for women where she was sent to Excelsior Spring, Missouri. She studied to become a medical laboratory technician for two years and graduated with honors.

In July 1970, Dorothy Ann relocated to Philadelphia, PA to live with relatives and was employed at the Regent Paper Box Company until it closed in December 1985. She then went on to have a career in the hotel industry as a housekeeper for a year. She then decided to attend Philadelphia OIC Nursing Assistant Program where she graduated as a Certified Nursing Assistant. Dorothy Ann was then employed at the Cheltenham-York Nursing Home and Albert Einstein Medical Center as a Certified Nursing Assistant. She retired from Albert Einstein Medical Center in 2009. After retiring she moved to Omaha, Georgia to care for her mother, until her passing in 2011.

She met and married Lawrence D. King and from this union came three daughters Stacia Sheree, April Tamia, and Bridgette Shavette.

Dorothy Ann had an inner strength and faith that allowed her to be healed and delivered from her diagnosis of breast cancer in 2002. She was able to complete her first Breast Cancer Awareness walk with her daughters and granddaughter on Mother's Day of 2003.

Dorothy Ann accepted the Lord in 1963 at the age of 16 and was baptized at Trinity A.M.E. church in Florence, Georgia. This was the beginning of her walk with Jesus Christ, one that would form the foundation of her life. She furthered her Christian walk at The Cathedral of Faith Missionary Baptist Church in Philadelphia in 1978 under the leadership of Bishop Barry E. Connelly. She served faithfully on the Pastor's Aide, Prayer Band, Women of Grace Praise Dancers, and Missionary Ministries. She often said these were her titles but thought herself more as a servant for Christ sent here to care for the sick through prayer and nourishment. Her legacy is one of southern warmth and she will be forever remembered for her collard greens and legendary desserts (including sweet potato pie).

She was preceded in death by her mother Charity Jackson-Rivers, her sister Dorothy Mae Jackson, and her brother Elijah "Jeep" Jackson, Sr.

She leaves to cherish and honor her memory three daughters, Stacia Sheree, April Tamia, and Bridgette Shavette. One son-in-law Ronald, Sr. Five Grandchildren Ayscia, Ronald, Jr., Alicia, Ryan, and Nile. One grand dog "Pepper". Three Great-Granddaughters Aria, Amoura, and Alani.
