In Loving Memory of



LuElla M Lehr

April 1, 1930 -November 1, 2021 uElla M. Lehr, age 91, went to her Heavenly home on November 1, 2021. She was born on April Fool's Day, 1930 to Paul and Clara (Knittel) Gramkow of rural Avon, S.D. She was the youngest of three children. With two brothers several years older, she soon learned to shadow them and turned out to be quite a "Tom Boy" much to the chagrin of her mother who preferred her to wear dresses and be a lady. Although she wore the dresses that her mother sewed from the printed material of feed and flour sacks, LuElla preferred overalls like those worn by her brothers, and the "seed of farming" was planted in her mind and heart.

LuElla attended Vesper Country School for seven years, but finished the eighth grade at Zion Lutheran Parochial School in Avon. She boarded with their Pastor, the Reverend Otto Pinnt and family, to save her parents many trips to Confirmation classes, but she definitely missed her country school friends and the wide open spaces. In May 1947, LuElla graduated from Avon High School. While a student, she was employed at the Avon Clarion newspaper office and learned to hand set type and gathered local news for the paper.

On October 5, 1947 she married Clarence Lehr, son of Edward G. and Anna (Dewald) Lehr of Tripp at Zion Lutheran Church in Avon. Reverend Pinnt had now baptized, confirmed and officiated at LuElla's wedding ceremony, all at Zion Lutheran. After marriage, LuElla joined Emmaus Lutheran Church at Tripp, where she remained a life-long member. Their marriage was blessed with three children, daughter Konnie (born on her father's 25th birthday, November 9), daughter Kim and son Kelly. LuElla's back problems, experienced from early childhood, became increasingly worse during the early years of her marriage and she was unable to continue caring for baby Konnie. Grandparents Gramkow then took her into their home and cared for her until she was a year old.

LuElla taught Sunday school at Emmaus for

many years, served on the Altar committee, was an officer of the AAL and chaired numerous committees. She helped design and sewed many of the Altar Paraments and was instrumental in securing funds to make the Christmons for the Christmas tree. She was an active member of the Tripp Women's Civic Club, formerly the Tripp Study Club, where she served as a club officer and held various chairmanships. She enjoyed doing volunteer work in church, the Club, the Library and in the community. With her flair for writing, she authored several histories for the book, Touch of Tripp III, published by the Tripp Civic Club.

A life member of Jelkin-Harms American Legion Auxiliary, Unit 142, LuElla held numerous Leadership and Chairmanship positions at the Unit, District and State levels, culminating with being elected South Dakota State President in 1992. She also served as National Executive Committeewoman and held several National appointments. She traveled to Washington D.C., Chicago and numerous states representing the American Legion Auxiliary, often accompanied by her husband, Clarence. LuElla's theme for her year as State President was "Legacy of Love" which is the Legacy she wishes to leave to all of you.

Besides her many travels on behalf of the Auxiliary, she and Clarence were part of the Habitat for Humanity "building blitz" at Eagle Butte, S.D. in 1994, joining 1,500 volunteers led by former United Stated President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalyn. Thirty homes were built that week, which were purchased by qualified Native American families. At the end of the week, volunteers witnessed several families move into to their new homes.

LuElla was truly a "help mate" for her husband, preferring to work side by side with him in the fields, often telling her family that she was born to be outside, and not a housewife. Later when five grandchildren were added to the family and the farm again heard children's voices and became a lively place during their many visits. They all wanted to stay at "Grandma's farm." Although the five great-grandchildren didn't get to visit the

farm, they all liked visiting "Grandma's house" in town. Clarence and Luella were Godparents to Janice Gramkow-Dunker, Julie Schnable-Hemeyer, Larry Maag (deceased), and Albert Schmidt, Jr.

On October 5, 2005, their 58th wedding anniversary, Clarence and LuElla left the farm and moved into a home in Tripp. Two years later, October 5, 2007 they celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary by riding in the Tripp-Delmont High School Homecoming parade in a 1928 Essex owned and driven by cousin Phyllis Dewald. Their 65th wedding anniversary was celebrated with their family. Clarence passed away quietly in their home on June 14, 2013, less than four months from their 66th wedding anniversary.

LuElla was always thankful to the Lord for walking beside her and giving her the faith and strength she needed to endure a lifetime of severe spinal problems, and eventually being unable to walk. She spent the last years of her life in Clarkson Care Center, Rapid City S.D. LuElla never lost her sense of humor, or the will to be an active participant in life. Her family was always her first love and concern.


