Our Dearest Linda.



She was the second-born child after her brother, Larry N. Boldin. Linda attended Mrs. Chilsolm Private School until the 4th grade. She attended Booker T. Washington Secondary School for 5th -loth grade and Sidney Lanier High School from 11th-12th grade, and graduated in 1973. As a child, Linda always had a captivating personality. She affectionately started calling her Granddaddy Boldin "Kee-Kee" while asking him for some candy that she was not supposed to have. She looked up at him and said, "Kee-Kee, please," and he gave her everything she asked for. From that day on, everyone in the family started calling him "Kee-Kee." One of the proudest moments for Linda's family, especially for her mom, was when Linda made the band becoming a member of the Booker T. Washington "Yellow Jackets" marching 100.


