Carol M. Maher, 86, of Menoken, passed away June 28, 2024.

Carol was born on May 15th, 1938 in St. Cloud, MN to Sidney & Henrietta Schermer. In 1952 Sid & Etta moved the family to Morristown, SD. Carol graduated from McIntosh, SD High School and then attended the National School of Business in Rapid City, SD.

On July 15th, 1958 Carol married the love of her life Francis (Buck) Maher at St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Buffalo, SD by Father Don Murray who Buck lived with for three years while going to High School in
