Did you know?

- If you are a tax payer and you would like to register for Gift Aid it is easy to do so using the card readers in the church porch. The first time you use the reader you will have to enter your name and address but after that your card will be recognised and the gift aid will be added automatically.

- If you are a gift aider, your payments are credited on the date when they are received. So if you are away and want to make up for missed contributions you don't need to use separate envelopes for the dates you have missed. Just put your donation into one envelope !

- Each month there is a second collection for the parish building fund and gift aiders can use the small envelopes which are available in the church porch. Please do not use these envelopes if you are not a gift aider – it costs the parish money and makes extra work for the volunteers who count the collection.

Parish Retreat to Worth Abbey

A Personal Perspective by Joanna Longhurst

Over half-term a group of twenty something of us headed off to Worth Abbey to spend a weekend On Retreat. I had had my misgivings. How were the dynamics going to work out? Was this an individual retreat? A joint retreat? A group retreat? I needn't have worried. We were free to follow our instincts. The theme was 'Come away and rest for a while' (Mk 6:31) and Worth Abbey, set in glorious Sussex countryside, was just the place to do precisely that. Amidst the backdrop of the Divine Office we reflected upon the story of Martha and Mary, enjoyed an entertaining and insightful talk by Dom Peter on the subject of Benedictine Spirituality, and celebrated a wonderfully intimate Eucharist in St Bruno's Guesthouse. By contrast, on the Sunday, we joined Monks and Parishioners for a theatrically choreographed, formal Eucharist, in the magnificent setting of the Abbey Church itself.

At the heart of this Retreat was the challenge of balance in our lives; balance between the contemplative and the active, between prayer and work, or, as the Benedictines would say, 'Ora et Labora'. Key Benedictine emphases, which struck a chord with me, also included Building Community and the need for Continual Conversion.

Moments of solitude could be found in the Abbey Church, open around the clock, in the Guesthouse Library turned cosy Oratory, or in the Quiet Garden a short walk away. Had time permitted, longer walks around the extensive grounds were also an option.

Mealtimes provided the perfect opportunity for convivial conversation, and the food was delicious, varied and plentiful!

I found the Retreat very uplifting. There was time and space for personal reflection, and also for communal discernment. I know I am not alone when I say that one of the things I appreciated most, was the chance to spend quality time with fellow Parishioners, in this deeply spiritual setting. Sincere thanks go to all who were involved in making this happen.

Assisted Suicide: Update and Fast Facts By Esther Theodore



A snow dog trail is currently in Buxton raising money for and awareness of our local hospice Blythe House. Perfect timing for this topic.

Assisted Suicide is back on the political and media agenda. We need to respond!

"In early September 2024, Our Lead Bishop for Life Issues, Bishop John Sherrington, called for Catholics to unite in prayer and compassionate action. That call is renewed now as on Wednesday, 16 October, the House of Commons heard the first reading of a new bill on assisted suicide tabled by Labour MP Kim Leadbeater.

This is another attempt to legalise assisted suicide and we need you to contact your MP to voice your opposition"

Bishops conference.

Arise, shine out, stand up and be counted!

As you will know, MPs will be voting on the Assisted Suicide Bill on 29 November 2024. This will be the most significant vote on life issues in a generation.

It is imperative that we urgently write to our MPs, and urge family and friends to also consider doing so, to express our view on this polarised debate, especially given the pressure on MPs from the multi-million pound "Dignity"-in-Dying lobby.

If you're short on time, use this link, which takes you to a pre written letter, you just need to put in your postcode (so it will send to the right MP). It is best if you can personalise the letter, but don't let that stop you!

1. Some may feel they want control over their own death

Arguing from a faith position, the intrinsic value and sanctity of human life from cradle to grave must be respected and protected at all costs.

Variations of the Hippocratic Oath sworn by (the majority of) doctors in the UK* convey a promise along the lines of the original Oath: "I will use my power to help the sick to the best of my ability and judgement; I will abstain from harming or wronging any man by it" - it orders doctors to do their best professionally and not use their skill or knowledge to harm or kill their patients.

*70% of UK medical schools report using the Oath

2. Some may be convinced assisted suicide is what is needed in the UK

There are extremely troubling stories and statistics from other countries which have brought in assisted suicide, pointing to large scale abuses of vulnerable people, for example, in Canada:

- army veterans with PTSD being offered 'Medical Assistance In Dying' (MAID)
- patients citing poverty or housing uncertainty as their main reason for seeking to end their lives through 'MAID'
- numbers spiralling out of control: in 2016 when 'MAID' was introduced, there were just over 1,000 cases but by 2022 this escalated to 13,241 deaths, accounting for 4.1% of all deaths in Canada.
- Canada is now on the verge of introducing euthanasia and assisted suicide for people with mental health issues, with this change in the law coming into effect in March 2027. (source: Right to Life)

As Sonia Sodha writes in The Observer, "An over-simple bill on a complex matter like assisted dying will fail to protect those who are most at risk... a reform which appeared nowhere in Labour's manifesto but which Starmer has made clear he personally supports nowhere near enough work done on what sufficient safeguards would look like, and how we would monitor whether or not they were working... Two of the most thoughtful members of his cabinet, Shabana Mahmood and Wes Streeting, have expressed serious reservations."

3. Some may fear suffering in pain at the end of life

Hospice care performs a vital function in easing the physical and emotional pain of death and dying. However, the hospice sector currently faces an estimated shortfall of £60 million in the current financial year. Hospices are crying out for funding to help them serve all those in need in their local communities. This ill thought through Bill must not be rushed through into law and more funding and resources should instead be directed towards vital palliative care services.

My friend, Fr Hugh McKenzie, shares a beautiful and moving perspective here: Assisted dying?: A hospital chaplain's opposition - Diocese of Westminster.

We pray for all those who are dying, for those working in end-of-life care, and for MPs and policy makers who are making decisions which will affect so many vulnerable people for generations to come. ODWR.



What is ChurchSuite and how do we use it in the Parish



ChurchSuite is an established software package that we use to manage parish administration. The software and parishioners' data are held securely online and comply with all data protection rules. Nothing is stored on any user's individual computer and nobody outside of the parish office has access to parishioners' data. ChurchSuite works on all personal computers including MacBooks as well as iPads and Smartphones.

There is a link on the website home page for new and existing parishioners to add/update their own details and contact preferences to ChurchSuite. It would be a great help to the Parish Office if all parishioners could re-enter their details so that the parish office can communicate more effectively with parishioners.

You can also enter a photograph to help identification.

Scam Emails

I am writing to bring to your attention a concerning rise in scam emails targeting our parishioners. These emails impersonate the parish priest, often using a similar email name and masking the real email address. They typically request the recipient to purchase Amazon or other gift cards as gifts for the priest.

Unfortunately, we have received reports of parishioners falling victim to these scams, with some individuals losing up to £600 to the fraudsters.

Please never purchase gift cards as gifts for the parish priest, based on an email request, unless they have verified the request directly in person or through a trusted means.

Please double-check any suspicious email by directly contacting the parish office.

Avoid sharing personal or financial information in response to unsolicited emails.

If you encounter these emails, please report them as spam and inform the parish office immediately.

Communication Pillar

Film Review by Alan Pavelin

During the 1940s the director Michael Powell, along with screenwriter Emeric Pressburger, made some of the most imaginative, colourful, and critically acclaimed British films ever produced, such as The Red Shoes and Black Narcissus. Prominent among them was A Matter of Life and Death (1946), set during the Second World War, with its highly original view of Heaven (referred to in the film as "the other world"). The film was retitled in America as Stairway to Heaven.

David Niven plays a wartime pilot, Peter Carter, who jumps out of his burning plane without a parachute. Finding himself wandering on land, he encounters a messenger from "the other world" who has come to collect him but was delayed by fog (the film is in some respects a comedyfantasy).

Peter sees the opportunity to argue that he should continue to live, and is taken up to "the other world" (shot in black-and-white, unlike the rest of the film) to plead his case. Meanwhile, in the "real world", he is having a major operation to save his life.

Peter's case to be allowed to live is made before a "heavenly court", on the grounds that he has fallen in love with an American girl he spoke with on the phone before jumping out of his plane.

His trial is argued out, amid a lot of British-American banter, the verdict depending on whether or not his real-world operation is successful.

I first saw this film at about age 12 in our school film society (Michael Powell was a former pupil) and didn't fully understand it. A later viewing clarified the story and the film became an established classic.

There is of course no suggestion that the representation of "heaven" should be taken as anything other than fantasy; it could not be otherwise, and films on the subject have generally been comedies or fantasies. At the time of writing, the film is to be shown shortly on the BBC so will be available on iplayer.


Payment details come in an automated reply, after you register.
