

How to Use Consequence by Empowering Parents

Do you find yourself repeatedly giving your child consequences, only to have them blow up in your face? Are you constantly asking yourself, "What am I doing wrong?"

If you end up in a power struggle after giving consequences, we can help.

Make Consequences Time-Limited and Task-Oriented: If you take something away, your child should know what specific behavior they need to show over a pre-established, short period of time in order to earn that privilege back. The goal is to teach your child what to do differently next time—not take a privilege away for the sake of punishment.

Use Only One Consequence at a Time: “Stacking” consequences is almost always ineffective. By giving a knee-jerk punishment rather than a well-thought-out consequence, you are lowering yourself to your child’s emotional level, which undermines your parental authority. To avoid this, try waiting to give a consequence until everyone is calm instead of acting in the heat of the moment.

Problem Solving is Key: Consequences alone do not change behavior. Otherwise, kids would simply stop acting out after you take a privilege away. Problem solving with your child about how they will act differently in the future is the key to lasting behavior change. Think of consequences and rewards as tools you can use to hold your child accountable.
