Be not burdened with times of sorrow:


I wish you the sunshine of tomorrow.

They both loved dogs and life became very interesting after adopting 2 rescues that became "their girls". Together they spent countless hours establishing their property and many evenings and weekends were spent on a garden tractor. Sunday's, however, were set aside as a day of rest meaning church, family, and football. Ricky's other passion was as a die-hard NFL football fan, specifically a lifelong Raiders fan in good times and in bad. For the most part, Ricky was a quiet guy until a bad call was made on the football field, and then watch out! When health became an issue and saying goodbye to the "farm" was necessary, Ricky and Julie were blessed to spend more time with family and watch the grandkids school and sports activities. He was so proud of them and loved attending basketball, soccer, football, or baseball games. Ricky loved his family and his life. He was a strong man and fought a difficult battle. He never forgot those he loved and though he has now left for a more peaceful place, he will always be with us.
