After his Dad's passing Dallas and Clarice moved to the home farm and had two children. During these years Clarice worked by his side as she enjoyed farming also. During the time the children were little our widowed mothers helped with the children which was a blessing.

Although busy with farm life, through the years they were able to travel to Alaska, Southwest US, and Texas. A highlight of their travels was a trip back to Germany in 1989. While there, they were able to visit their landlords from the Army days. Precious memories!

An enjoyment of Dallas was to belong to the Antique Tractor Club. His interest was to restore small Farmall tractors.

His son, Wesley, took over the farm at Dallas' retirement. Dallas loved going over to the home farm every day to help with farming and field work.


Our family attended and was active in Calvary Covenant Church in Evansville.
