nd now...because of what the Lord has done, we give thanks, a standing ovation for the life and times of Prince Johnson, Jr., husband, father, grandfather, brother, and loyal friend across generations. He had a dry sense of humor, fairness, compassion, and the uncanny ability to put others at ease no matter the occasion. He unassumingly cared for others, and would literally without hesitation, say yes to the crisp, white shirt off his back.

Oh, how memories of him will live forever; how he believed in the resilience of people; and, the importance of emulating good character and a spirit of trust. His committed work ethic was a true testament of his upbringing, guided by his parents, the late Prince, Sr. and Dorothy Mae Lawyer Johnson. As a young teenager, Prince moved around the corner from his parents and siblings to live with his aunt, Ophelia Jones, where he helped her in the daily running of her confectionary store on Savannah's westside. The Westside taught him things that his parents and aunt were not proud of, but he took those street lessons and applied them to his book lessons, graduating from Saphronia M. Tompkins High School, *Most Studious*, in the class of 1964. Prince, Jr. went on to continue his education, *thinking* he would attend college and later register for mortuary school. His studies and labs seemed interesting, until one lab class led him to a few sleepless nights -the dissecting of a cat...that ended that (in his voice). While at Savannah State College, Prince pledged Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. ('67) and was a member of the Men's Glee Club concert choir. In 1968, he earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology.

With an amazing bass voice -both singing and speaking, Prince blessed the ears of many Savannahians who tuned into hear him on WSOK Radio Station, which at that time was the only black, local radio station. He and best friend, Leonard Jenkins were two young disc jockeys, enjoying life, and sometimes used the airwaves for their own personal messaging. Prince met a young lady and would occasionally dedicate the song "Me and Mrs. Jones" to her -the lady in the white Cougar. He was cool and smooth with it!

In 1971, Prince no longer had to send his nameless song dedications to "the lady in the white cougar". On August 28th at St. Anthony's Catholic Church, he married her. Young Prince married into a family where he was never considered an "in-law", he was always family. Together, he and Hilda Reaves loved each other unconditionally and raised two little people of their own. He had a deep commitment to family. He meant the world to them -a friend and confidant; their own personal suited, superhero of respect and integrity, showing them the value of trust, responsibility, and reliability. All of Myron and Princess' friends loved their "cool daddy".

His first professional job was the beginning of an extensive public service career. Prince never forgot his friends and other Savannahians that were not afforded some of the same opportunities as him. When he landed his job with the Economic Opportunity Authority (EOA), he used this as his chance to circle back. At EOA, he provided old and new friends with job development and training, helping to prepare them for work -from résumé

assistance to skill-building to tying ties. However, Prince eventually moved on and began working at the Department of Labor Resources during the height of the civil rights and urban renewal movements that were stirring in Savannah. In the Office of Community Services, he became deeply involved in administering the department's job training programs and other community enhancement projects of the city. Prince later joined the Revenue Department, where he worked alongside the first African American to be employed by the

agency. These milestone moments captured his zeal for public service, and led to his enrollment at Georgia Southern College, where he received his Master's degree in Public



Administration. As Prince entered a new decade, he was asked to manage the Savannah location of Exclusive Temporaries, a full service, permanent and temporary placement service. Even though he had earned his second degree, he still had the desire to become an entrepreneur, and opened his own janitorial supply company, MyPrin Distributors. Years later, MyPrin dissolved under the economy's pressure, and Prince continued his public service by joining a new group of outstanding pros, where he was the Court Director for the Recorder's Court of Chatham County. After more than 30 years of committed public service on behalf of the residents of his native Savannah, Prince retired in 2012.

His commitment to church, community, and Alma Mater was no different, as he served in a number of lay roles at St. Benedict the Moor Catholic Church, where he was a Lector, past President of Parish Council, and a member of the "Monday Counters". In his spare time, Prince enjoyed getting on his bass guitar, mimicking tunes from some of his old wax tunes, while watching CNN and Headline News. He loved hearing all about what his granddaughters were up to.

The pain felt by each of us these past few days, leaves us scrambling to move on without him. His undenied will came from a place of having loved and been loved unconditionally by wife of forty-nine years, Hilda; son, Myron (Vivica); daughter, Princess; granddaughters, Caylen, Rayna, Ryan, Jada, Jay'Sherie, J'Laila and Jai; siblings, Benjamin Lawyer, Mary L. Jones, Amos (Betty) Johnson, Sr., and Pamela (Troy) Edwards; sisters-in-law, Sandra Lawyer and Kathy Reaves; brother-in-law, Donnie Reaves; mother-in-law, Carolyn M. Reaves; aunts, Ruth E. Germany and Toweezer Suber; uncle, James E. Harrell; goddaughter, Irene Alexis; and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, church family, friends, and the Saphronia M. Tompkins Class of 1964. He will never forget his special neighbors, Abraham and Annette Mitchell, David and Pat Williams, Cynthia and the late Freddie Smith, David Dearing, and the late Lee Watts Williams, Sr.
