At night she was back to the typewriter. It was during one of these airshows that Red Baron/Schwans discovered the Maggie and Jerry team. Jerry narrated nationwide for the Red Baron Stearman Squadron for the next 14 years while Maggie kept the team organized and did company PR. They continued with Red Baron until retiring at age 79. Maggie loved this job and the travel that came with it. It was the perfect ending to a hard earned retirement.

Margaret and Jerry lived in their home until January of 2017, when they moved to Knute Nelson. Margaret passed peacefully with family at her side in the morning of September 10, 2018, at the age of 93 years.
